

Know all men by these presences that I Elias P Muse of Darlington District and state aforesaid for the Love and good will and affection that I have and do bare unto my beloved Father Thomas Muse do give unto him during his natural life & Mother Elizabeth Muse the negros Viz Charles Agnes & Burrell under this positive consideration that my Father Dispose of said negroes at his & my mothers Death in the following manner. One negro boy to my Brother Humphry Muse (upon this proviso) that the said Humphry Muse shall come to me & acknowledge that he will be a friendly & affectionate Brother & will continue to be unless causes different from our present expectations shall hereafter take place. The other two negroes to be given to my Brother Thomas Muse at my mother & Fathers Death with this expectation to the disposal of the whole [of] the above stated negroes that they shall be disposed of by neither of my brothers for debt contract or otherwise but to become the property of their lawful hiers if they themselves shallcome forward to receive them and defering Brothers Humphries Muse & Thomas Haas[7] Muse should never return to my Fathers house agreeable to the conditions stated at my fathers and mothers Death said negroes to return back to myself or my hiers as will be hereafter stated.

HISTORY OF LITTLE RIVER BAPTIST CHURCH ABBEVILLE COUNTY

The records of the church for the first eighteen years of its existence having been lost, it will be impossible to give anything like a full history of the church. Having had access to the records of Turkey Creek, of which it was originally an "arm", we have been able to glean a few facts therefrom, which, together with reliable tradition, prevents the period from being entirely blank.

The church is located near Due West, in Abbeville county, and was constituted August 27, 1791, with thirteen members, dismissed from Turkey Creek church for that purpose. Elders Moses Holland, Joseph Redding and M. Beardin composed the presbytery on the occasion. Tradition says that George

Tillman was the first pastor; Brethren Joseph Culp and ______ were the first deacons, having been elected in September, 1791.

On the 10th of February, 1798, Deacon Thomas Shirley was dismissed from Turkey Creek.

Tradition says he joined the Little River Church as a deacon.

On December the 11th, 1802, there is a request from Little River for Benjamin Northcut to attend that church on Saturday before the first Lord's day in February, 1803, to assist them in settling a difficulty that had arisen in the Little River Church, not stating, however, the nature of the trouble. Tradition says that party spirit was strife in the church—the Armstrong party sustaining Pastor Tillman, and the Gant party opposing him; party spirit causing one William Ball to carry his gun to the church to shoot the pastor. About this time Elder Tillman resigned the care of Turkey Creek and Little River churches, and left the State.

In August, 1807, the Little River Church united with the Saluda Association, having been dismissed from the Bethel Association.

Some time during the year 1808, Elder Arthur Williams transferred his membership from Providence to Little River church, and, in 1810, became pastor of the church, there having been services held here during the six or seven years prior to his call only at intervals. The little church, hitherto torn by party spirit, is now to enter upon a career of usefulness under the pastoral care of Brother Williams, whose ministrations were to last for fifty years.

On the 17th of February, 1810, two brethren stated they had settled a difficulty which had existed between them—an example worthy of imitation at present. In July, 1811, two dollars were sent to the

Association, the first record of any moneys forwarded for any purpose.

The July minutes of 1812 say that the 31st instant was the day set apart to repair the meeting-bouse, the first intimation in the records of any building. Tradition says the first building was a small log bouse, which stood about one mile south from the present site, on the road leading from Donalds to Antreville near the resience of Mr. J.R. McWhorter, and was [illigible word] the Hog-Skin meeting-house.

In September, 1828, it was resolved to meet on every first Sunday for prayer in addition to their regular meetings on the third Sunday and Saturday before. The brethren seem to have felt the need even then of meeting oftener than once a month. It was also agreed to celebrate the Lord's Supper three times

a year, instead of twice a year as formerly.

On January 17, 1829, it was resolved to have the church incorporated. In August following a resolutions was adopted concurring with the Charleston and Saluda Associations in regard to instructing the colored people. At the October meeting the question of "communing" with the Pedo-baptists was taken up and discussed with the following result: "We think sst, according to the Word."

On February 19, 1831, the following query was discussed: "Is it right for church members to attend and pay out their money at false shows" Answer. "We think it not right, according to divine truth." In 1832 they felt the need of a larger and better house of worship. A large frame building was then erected

and weather-boarded, but never ceiled.

It was agreed, September the 14th, 1833, that all white male members should contribute of their means to the support of the pastor and to the defraying of the general expenses of the church, the clerk to act as treasurer. In October of this year the question of establishing a Sunday-school was laid on the table until the next meeting, at which time a committee was appointed to devise a plan for conducting a Sunday-school, which report was referred until the January meeting, 1834, when it was rejected. On the 28th day of May, 1836, Cador Gant was ordained to the gospel ministry, Elders A. Williams, B. Burton, R. Gaines, J. Fant, and William Ray constituting the Presbytery. About this time Thomas Fisher and Thomas Crawford were elected deacons.

On July 16 the request of the Association, that each church say whether or not it was willing for

that body to become a member of that Baptist State convention, was answered in the negative. The church having built a pool and dressing rooms, was accused by a brother of having a spirit of pride, whereupon he was promptly excluded.

On March, 1837, it was determined to deal with members who attended valentines, or permitted members of their family to do so. On September 16, a committee was appointed to examine strange ministers before allowing them to preach in the pulpit. One of the brethren having been drunk the third time was excluded. A query as to whether or not a reformation is needed in the church was answered in

the affirmative.

The church held its first protracted meeting in October, 1839, which resulted in six additions. This seems to have pleased the brethren so well they held another in November, with five additions. In 1840 brethren Reuben Kay, Richardson Tribble, John Pratt, Jr., and William Clinkscales were ordained deacons, and Thomas Crawford set apart to the full work of the gospel ministry. In July of the following year, William Clinkscales was elected treasurer of the church. In 1842 the delegates to the Association were instructed to vote as they saw proper on the quesion of the Association's uniting with the Baptist State Convention. Another meeting of days was held in July of this year with thirty additions. The brethren let their love and admiration of their pastor get the better of their sober judgment at their meeting in October, when they resolved that Brother Williams bear the title of "D.D." in future, which action they rescinded in January following, "believing that the Scriptures do not authorize the churches to confer such appellations on any person."

In 1844 Hugh Robinson was received as a deacon from Broadmouth Church, his letter also stating that he had been licensed to exercise in public prayer and exhortation, which privileges were granted him by the Little River Church. The action of the Saluda Association, in employing brethren to travel as missionaries in the bounds of the Association and in the mountain regions of the State was disapproved. However, about this [illigible word] the church became an auxiliary of the American Bible Society, for the

purpose of aiding in the distribution of Bibles, tracts, &c.

There was for several years, embracing the years 1843-49, and perhaps longer, a total abstinence society, which held its sessions in the meeting-house, and was composed largely of the members of the church, with Eklers A. Williams and James Kay, and brethren William Pratt, L.W. Tribble and John R. Wilson as officers.

OBITUARY OF LAWSON H. WILSON

Funeral service for Lawson H. Wilson, 85, one of the county's best known citizens, who died at his home in Cross Anchor Friday afternoon after an illness of several weeks will be conducted at the residence in Cross Anchor at 3 o'clock this afternoon by the Rev. D. S. Lee and the Rev. J. G. Huggins. Burial will be in the Cross Anchor Methodist church cemetery. Mr. Wilson had been in declining health for several years.

He was born in Rutherfordton county, N. C., on Feb. 2, 1860, moving to Cross Anchor while a young boy about 70 years ago. He was actively engaged in all community and county activities. He was an active member of the Cross Anchor Methodist church, a Mason and a Shriner.

Until several years ago Mr. Wilson operated a large general store and the Cross Anchor bank in Cross Anchor, and one of the county's largest farms. He owned the Cross Anchor House, which was

borned several years ago and which was known by all old settlers in this part of the state.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. St. Lawrence Irby and Mrs. C. M. Workman, both of Cross Anchor, and Mrs. Gene Garrison of Anderson; nine grandchildren and several great-grandchildren. His wife, the former Miss Fannie DeShields, died in 1935.

Active pallbearers will be Vernon Harris, Horace Parham, Grover Templeton, Roy Simmons, Warren Dillard and Collier Poole.

The body will remain at the M. W. Bobo funeral chapel until 11 o'clock today, at which time it will be taken to the home and remain there until services.

The family asks that flowers please be omitted.

GREENVILLE DISTRICT MAGISTRATES AND FREEHOLDERS COURT RECORDS

The Magistrates and Freeholders Court was the body which tried slaves and free persons of color for various legal offenses ranging in severity from minor misdemeanors to serious offenses such as murder and insurrection. The surviving records of this court for Greenville District are obviously very incomplete. Less than 50 cases survive covering the 70 years slavery existed in that county. The earliest of the extant records is dated 1854. The complete text of each case is being presented here. The editor has retained (as fat as is possible) the orthography and arrangement of the records. However, a few editorial intrusions have been necessary such as rearrangment of the order of the documents in chronological order. The original records are at the S. C. Dept. of Archives and History, Columbia, SC.

Your are hereby appointed Overseer of the Public Road from
Snoddies Bridge to the ^fork^ of the Road
below the Bilgrog old field with all hand liable to do Road duty.

INSTRUCTIONS.

1st. All Market Roads are to be opened twenty feet wide, and the roads crossing the country must be opened statem feet wide, clear of drains or ditches, and all stumps, bushes, stones and roots must be entirely removed.

2nd. On all wet grounds, and grounds subject to wash, so as to injure the roads, ditches must be formed, and the earth thrown on the middle of the road, so that it be regularly elevated to the centre — and on all hilly grounds, water passes or breaks, must be constructed to turn water from the road.

3rd. All swamps and marshes must be causewayed or elevated, and made firm with rock or timbers, with water breaks left at proper intervals.

4 th. W]fold in center of page| the roads [can?] be improved by cutting ____ bends it must be done.

5th. All roads leading from the Court House, must be measured, and posted, and numbered, from
the Court House to the District line — And all roads crossing the country, to be measured, posted and
numbered from the District line, or other noted places — Posts to be made of stone, post oak, or other
durable timber.

6th. Sign boards must be placed at the forks of all public roads, giving the direction and distance to the most noted places to which they lead — Sign boards will be furnished by me for my Division, on application of the Overseer.

All Overseers failing to keep the roads as required above, will be subject of the penalty of the Law.

OLD NEWSPAPER CORRESPONDENCE TELLS OF DEVELOPMENT OF WELLFORD AS NEW SETTLEMENT ON RAILROAD BACK IN 1873

Editor's Note: The following item is an undated newspaper clipping that was found among the Sexton papers by Lynn Sellers. She believes it was probably printed sometime during the 1930s or 1940s.

Wellford, located about 11 miles from Spartanburg on the Greenville highway, had its beginnings

in 1873. It is now one of the most progressive towns in the county. Located on paved roads, it has Baptist and Presbyterian churches, and its children attend Wellford grammar and Wellford -Lyman -Tucapau high schools.

Important mills are located near the town. Numbers of the residents are employed in Jackson, Tucapau and Lyman mills. In 1930 the population was 400.

Some of Early History

Letters printed in the Carolina Spartan beginning in April, 1875, recount some of the town's early history. "Wellford," the correspondent writers, "is a new place on the airline railroad about 11 miles west of Spartanburg. It has grown up since its location about 18 months ago with marvelous rapidity. There is a depot here, three stories, a blacksmith shop, two shoe shops, a broom factory and 12 private residences. A lodge of Good Templars hold meetings in Mumford hall. We also have a school under way. It was opened in February and is well attended." The school was under the supervision of P. J. Oeland.

Preaching was done twice a month, the correspondent wrote, by Mr. Reid of Reidville and Mr. Wood, one of the Wellford merchants, who was a minister.

In another letter a short while later, a large building for a chapel and high school was reported being erected. It was located on the railroad and had a fine mountain view. The building was to be two stories in height, measuring 50x26, with a portico in front and "with steps something after the style of the courthouse," the correspondent added. Plans were contemplated, he said, to establish a collegiate institute of the highest standing.

Small Happenings

Smaller happenings were reported from time to time.

A. M. McElrath planted a large amount of cotton. Dr. A. L. Moore was reported to have some "fine fields of wheat."

Col. P. S. Whisenant established a steam saw mill in the community to engage in the manufacture of tobacco boxes and do a general sawing business.

In the spring of 1875 Mr. Coan and Mr. Zimmerman of Reidville purchased a store from R. L. Taylor. Mr. Taylor in turn bought a store lot and dwelling from the Rev. J. A. Wood.

On May 10, 1875 a "May day picnic was given by Miss Hattie Vernon and Miss Nettie Benson on the greesward near Benson's mills between two streams which form the North Tyger."

In a letter May 31, 1875 it was reported that Mr. Roberts of near Cashville had purchased land. He "intends moving up to educate his family."

Dr. DeBard, whose early days were spent at Woodruff, was reported to be living at Wellford and active as a physician.

On June 14, Maj. J. S. Hammond was said to have bought lands adjoining the town. About this time Dr. Jones of Asheville purchased a water power business on Penny Shoals adjacent to Ballenger's mills. He expected to operate mills and a factory.

Manly Bright, former superintendent of Ballenger's mills, began operating a blacksmith shop at Wellford.

On Aug. 17 a squirrel barbecue and farmers dinner took place at Jordan's spring, near Ballenger's mills. Speeches were made by J. B. Williamson, Capt. Alvan Dean, P. J. Oeland and Jerry Burnett. The subject was "The No Fence Law."

On Sept. 20 Capt. J. A. Hammond was reported to be putting up a large and commodious residence

at the lower end of the town, and W. D. Howe another at the upper end.

In the fall John D. Smith repainted and refitted his store and laid in a new stock. A wholesale and retail grocery was to be operated by Jacob Zimmerman.

By No. 22, the correspondent reported there were seven stores, and 25 families residing in the

BOOK REVIEWS

Sketches of the Dahneys of Virginia with some of the Family Reserds by William H. Dahney. Paperback, 206 pages including errata and index. In 1685, two French Huguenot brothers John and Cornelius d'Aubigné fled from France to Wales where they lived until ca. 1715-1720 when they removed to Virginia establishing one of the most well connected families in the Tidewater. (Along the way, the name was Anglicized to Dahney.) Among the old, established families with whom the Dahneys intermarried are Armistead, Barrett, Catt, Carter, Gregory, Harris, Hill, Jennings, Lee, Lewis, Madison, Nelson, Page, Pope, Stuart, Todd, Wiley, and Winston. Robert d'Aubigné's son, Charles, located in Massachusetts and established an equally prominent branch of the family. Mr. Dahney chronicled both the male and female decedents of all Dahneys about whom he could find any information. At the time of the writing of this volume (1887), the author admitted that much was unknown about the family's history and much had been lost. However, he certainly did posterity a big favor by recording and publishing what information he knew. The "Observations" both biographical and anecdotal are especially valuable. (The latter are often easily lost to the ravages of time. How many of us know family stories which tell of the adventures and character of our third great grandmother?) After being unavailable to the general public for 112 years, it is a pleasure to see the Dabney family history once again in print.

The Founding of Harman's Station with an Account of the Indian Captivity of Mrs. Jennie Wiley and the Exploration and Settlement of the Big Sandy Valley in the Virginia and Kentucky by William Elsey Connelley. This reprint of this 1910 title is a must for the eastern Kentucky researcher. If this book isn't a classic, it should be. Harman's Station is in eastern Kentucky and its early settlement is filled with all the danger and trepidation of frontier life. Among the many adventures recounted in the first part is the captivity Mrs. Jennie Sellards Wiley by the Shawnee. The second portion is devoted to the genealogy of the Connelley family in the area. This family initially settled in South Carolina and migrated westward to Kentucky via Virginia after the Revolution. The author has included detailed documentation on many family members from the earliest times in this country until the publication of this volume. Mr. Connelley included much information on this area which will not be found elsewhere. It is presented in a highly readable format. Maps, line drawing, and photographs provide the illustrations.

This first portion of this original publication traces the descendants of Thomas Roberts, one of the founding fathers of New Hampshire who settled in the area in the 1620s and died in Dover, NH ca. 1673 and his wife Rebecca (whose maiden name might have been Hilton) while the second chronicles the progeny of George Roberts (b. ca. 1640-1650 d. 1691-1692) of the Exeter, NH area who married one Mary Jones. (Due to the lack of records from this era, the parentage of George Roberts is uncertain and it is possible that these two groups are totally unrelated.) Mr. Jacobsen, who descends George Roberts traces both these families from the 1600s to the present. He thoroughly documents his text and with the exception of the presentation of dates in a numeric form (which can be open to misinterpretation) rather than the standard format is a model for fledgling authors. Although I have absolutely no genealogical interest in this area, I found this an interesting and enjoyable volume to peruse.

In 1798, Andrew Stuart published this title tracing 22(f) generations of the Royal House of Stuart of Scotland starting in the twelfth century. The author presents many rare and important documents in full. He pays special attention to the Stuarts of Darnely, Lennox, amd Aubigny and those of Castelmilk. This is an absolute must for those researching this royal house or interested in Scottish history. The complete text of the 1798 edition has been issued in facsimile reprint. As useful as this book is, it would have behooved the editor to include a full name index. Unfortunately, one must depend on the contents to serve as a pseudo index and it includes only the major personages. Still, this is a major work and despite the lack of an index, it is a must for the library of any Stuart enthusiast.

Unlike other cemetery books, this one is crafted to meet the genealogist's needs by paying special attention to the plot and row arrangement of the graves. It presents transcripts of 58 Spartanburg County cemeteries in their entirety. Among the churches presented are Philadelphia Baptist, Bethesda Baptist, Concord Methodist, Mount Carmel Methodist, New Hope Methodist, and North Pacolet Presbyterian. In all, 21 churches, including 7 extinct ones, are published. Also, 34 family cemeteries, and 3 community and private cemeteries appear here.

Marriages From THE CAROLINA SPARTAN Newspapers 1866-1869, compiled and edited by Faye Berry Emory 27 pages, indexed. Soft Cover \$7.

This is a complete listing of 1866-1869 marriages found in THE CAROLINA SPARTAN, a Spartanburg. South Carolina newspaper. Although these marriages are found in Spartanburg newspapers, they are not confined to that area. Many pertain to persons living in other counties of South Carolina and a few concern persons living in other states.

The Descendants of James Crook and Related Families 1746-1978, compiled and edited by Martha King Neubster 463 pages, including 63 page index

The society has acquired the 28 remaining copies of this detailed study of the James Crook family of Virginia and later Spartanburg County, S.C. However, the late Mrs. Neubauer did not limit this work to this particular family. She included information on other branches of the Crook family in England and America. She also included pictures of tombstones and various Crook homes. The second part includes information on the following related families: Anthony, Bane, Barry, Brockman, Burk, Coleman, Evins, King, Mann, Newman, Patton, Stallworth, Travis, and White families. "Bits and Pieces" (Part III) is an abstract from records of persons of the same surname, but with whom no proof of relationship had been established.

The 1820 Census, Chester District, South Carolina, compiled by Faye Berry. 31 pages, soft cover.

Faye Berry has abstracted the information found in the 1820 federal census for the over 1,500 families then living in Chester District. (Included in this volume are 14 families headed by "free persons of colour.") This volume eliminates the need of sitting in front of a microfilm viewer to find your ancestor's family here in 1820. This is a republication of a 1885 volume on Mount Zion Baptist Church, near Inman, Spartanburg County, S.C. It traces the church from its establishment as a mission of Bethlehem Baptist in 1804, through it organization in 1827, up to the history's publication in 1884. This volume, though small in size, contains a wealth of information, both historical and genealogical, on Mount Zion and its early members.

The Tie That Binds, by Joseph R. Gainey. 135 pages, filustrated, soft cover \$25.00

This book is a history of the Carlisle Wesleyen Church located in Spartanburg County, South Carolina. It contains many pictures and extensive genealogical notes on its early families. It also contains miscellaneous data on the community.
