

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#### UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGY AND HISTORY

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## FIRST COURT IN SPARTANBURG COUNTY ESTABLISHED IN 1785 UNDER FAMOUS PENDLETON ACT, JUDGE GANTT RECALLS

Contributor's Note: The following article was transcribed from the Spartanburg Herald Journal, Sunday, April 9, 1939. The author was D. A. Russell. The editor at that time stated that this was the ninth in a series of interviews with Judge R. J. Gantt, a well known Spartanburg attorney, recalling incidents of historical importance in the Carolinas and Georgia.

In today's interview Judge Gantt gives the history of the first court which was established in Spartanburg County in 1785. The county court was, in that period, "the government of the county." The first court records were secured by Judge Gantt from legal books in the office of County Clerk, Earnest W. Miller.

The county court, of which Judge Gantt tells in this interview, could not punish high crimes such as murder, or other felony, but occupied most of its time with minor offenses.

The records of this period reveal that James Yancey was the first lawyer that was licensed to practice in Spartanburg County by the county court at its June term in 1785. The second lawyer to be admitted to practice in the county court was William Shaw, while the third was Peter Carnes. More concerning the latter two attorneys will be in succeeding interviews.

#### Divided into Counties

In 1765 South Carolina was divided into what were known as judicial districts. What is now Spartanburg County, was at that time a part of Ninety Six district, which embraced Pickens, Anderson, Edgefield, Abbeville, Spartanburg, Greenville, Laurens, Newberry and Union counties.

In 1785 Judge Pendleton, who was a native of Virginia, proposed and had passed a law dividing the state into 34 counties for the purpose of establishing county courts for the government of the people. This was followed by a flood of lawyers from Virginia and Maryland. That was the real beginning of Spartanburg county. Spartanburg was then given the first court to be held within its borders. It was not a court of general sessions, or common pleas, as we know them today, but was presided over by five justices of the peace, and was held quarterly. It was this act of Judge Pendleton that gave birth to the town of Spartanburg as the seat, or place of holding, of the county court. The higher court was still held at Ninety Six until 1791, when the Ninety Six district was divided, and Spartanburg was made part of a new district called Pinckney, and embracing the counties of Spartanburg, Laurens, Union, Newberry, York, and Chester. The higher court was held at Pinckneyville, a "dead town", located now in Union county.

#### County Court Abolished

"The court of general sessions and common pleas was not held in Spartanburg until 1799, when the county court was abolished on account of its inefficiency, and real county government was established in the counties, including Spartanburg," said Judge Gantt

"I mention these facts in order that those interested may know that Spartanburg was a county long before it had a higher court.

"The first court records in the clerk's office here are the records of the county court established under the Pendleton Act of 1785. At that time the county court of Spartanburg was the government of the county. The five Justices of the peace, with the aid of the grand jury of the county, built a court house, jail and whipping post. The last named institution seemed to have been pretty generally used by the court. Until this court was abolished, the court named the sheriff, the clerk, the coroner, road commissioners,

bailiffs and constables. This was the government. The court could not punish high crimes, such as murder or other felony, but the time of the court seemed to have been taken up in collecting small debts, granting licenses to keep inns, fixing the price at which liquor and food could be sold, proving deeds and wills, administering on the estates of deceased people, establishing "marks" for cattlemen, appointing road overseers, opening new roads, giving judgments of record that some citizen's ear had been bit off in a fight, so as to keep from being marked as a criminal, trying persons for cursing the grand jury and the court, and for minor offenses.

#### Became Unpopular

"Inasmuch as the judges were appointed by the governor, upon recommendation of the legislature, and all the other officers were appointed by the court, this institution in the free atmosphere following the Revolutionary war, became unpopular. In the awakening of the back country under the impulse of Jeffersonian democracy, the county court was swept out of existence, and government was given to the people rather than by the appointment handed down by the government.

"It is an interesting fact that the prejudice against county courts lasted for a century, and the people of Spartanburg refused to establish one until the twentieth century. The first lawyer that was licensed to practice in Spartanburg county was licensed by the county court, at its June term in 1785, and was James Yancey. He was the father of a distinguished lawyer, Benjamin C. Yancey, and the grandfather of William L. Yancey, of Alabama, who was reputed to have done more than any other individual to bring on secession and the War Between the States.

"At that time lawyers rode the circuit and James Yancey lived at Ninety Six. If I mistake not, he was a native of Maryland, and was the father of Benjamin C. Yancey, who was a protégé of Robert Goodloe Harper, and became the leading lawyer of upper South Carolina. Benjamin Yancey far exceeded his father, James Yancey, in reputation. He settled in Abbeville, and married a Miss Byrd of Georgia, and served as a member of the legislature from Abbeville, and took a high position in that body. He later moved to Charleston and was attorney in the famous 'Jew-land' cases, involving the title to a vast area of land embracing a greater portion of Abbeville, Laurens, and Anderson counties that had been granted before the Revolutionary war to an ancestor of Francis Salvador, a Jew who lived in that section, and was one of the real heroes of the revolution.

#### Salvador Killed

"Salvador was a member of the first committee of safety of this colony and when the British turned the Cherokee Indians loose on the settlers of the up-country in 1776, he valiantly left his safe seat at Charleston and came to the up-country to command a regiment for the protection of his neighbors. He was killed near the present site of Clemson college. He was a brilliant young man, unmarried, and left no heirs on this continent. Long after the revolution his kin from England employed Benjamin C. Yancey to recover this property from trespassers, and Yancey died suddenly in Edgefield county on a trip to the up-county to look after the interest of his client.

"A brilliant young lawyer at the time of his death, he was universally lamented by the bar and judiciary of the state. Yancey's widow married a Presbyterian minister living at Washington, Georgia. She went north, carrying with her her son, William L Yancey, who remained out of state until he was 17 or 18 years old when he returned. He read law at Greenville in the office of Governor Perry, and later married a Miss Earl of Greenville. He was a strong union man and, due to criticism of speech by Waddy Thompson, his wife's kinsman, had a difficulty with a young son Dr. Earl, an uncle of his wife. My grandfather, Thomas W. Gantt, was a personal friend of William Yancey, and I have often heard him tell the details of the killing of Dr. Earl by Yancey. After his trial and conviction, Yancey was pardoned by

Governor Noble, his father's friend, moved to Alabama and, from being a strong union man became a strong nullifier and secessionist. The Alabama resolution introduced by him in the Democratic convention at Charleston split the Democratic party, resulted in the election of Lincoln for president, a change of events that led to secession and the War Between the States.

"William I.. Yancey was confederate senator from Alabama. I remember as a child hearing my grandfather tell of taking a trip down the river from Montgomery to Mobile after Yancey had been in the Confederate senate, and then spending the night talking over the events of their younger days at Greenville. My grandfather said that Yancey told him, "Tom, you know I did not intend to kill Dr. Earl, and I would give fame, fortune and everything I possess if I could wash the blood of Earl from my hands." One of William Yancey's sons, Goodloe H. Yancey, was business partner of my father for years, and was a prominent Georgian. Mr brother Yancey Gantt bears that name by reason of a family connection.

"There is a number of the same family in North Carolina living around Marion, and Yancey county, North Carolina gets its name from the same folks.

"The name of the first lawyer admitted to the bar in Spartanburg awoke this train of thought, and I thought that perhaps others might be interested in this."

## OBITUARY OF JAMES LETT, SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR

DIED - At his residence near the village of Spartanburgh, on the 20th ult., Mr. JAMES LETT, a Soldier of the Revolutionary War. The deceased had attained the age of nearly one bundred years, and retained his mental faculties and much of his muscular powers and hardihood, up to the time of his death. At an early stage of the Revolution, he attached himself to a Rifle corps, and continued in active service until the end of the war, and such was his predilection for his favorite instrument of warfare, that he was identified with it in all the after scenes of life. The deceased was interred near his late residence on the day after his death with Military honors, promptly afforded by Capt. Legg and a part of his Company, the Spartanburgh Volunteers,

Thus has another ripened leaf fallen from the tree of of Liberty. But few more remain, and a few more days will sink the last from the view of a grateful country.

## FROM THE LAW LIBRARY

## Mary P. Schoppert, by Next Friend, v. James Gilliam and Others

Before Johnston, Ch., at Newberry, July 1853.

This case will be fully understood from the opinion delivered in the Court of appeals. Sullivan, for appellants.

Jones, Garlington, contra.

The opinion of the Court was delivered by

JOHNSTON, Ch. Robert Gillam died in 1814, leaving his wife, Elizabeth, and three children, to wit: William, James and Sarah. Sarah had been married to Philemon Berry Waters; who died in 1807, and by whom she had three children, Robert, Philemon, and Mary B. After the death of her husband, Philemon Berry Waters, Sarah had become the wife of William Sheppard.

In the will of Robert Gillam, executed the 27th of October 1813, the following dispositions occur,

among others not necessary to notice:

["It also give unto my said beloved wife," (Elizabeth,) "a negro fellow named Tom, and a wench, named Linn, and her child," &c., "during her natural life: and at her death, to be sold, together with their increase, (if any,) and equally divided between my two sons, William and James, or their heirs, and the survivng children of Philemon Berry Waters, deceased.

"I also give to my daughter, Sarah Sheppard, in addition to what I have already given her, twenty

dollars."

This trifling sum is all that is given to Sarah Sheppard in any part of the will: so that the gifts of the testator to her, to which he alludes, must have been made anterior to the will.

Elizabeth [Gillam], the widow of the testator, died in 1851, at a very advanced age, about ninety years: and the executor, in pursuance of the directions of the will, took possession of the slaves, with their increase, and sold them, and now holds the proceeds.

It is stated in the pleadings, and agreed on, that Philemon Berry Waters never had any other children than the three above named: all of whom were alive at his death, and at the death of the testator, Robert Gilliam.

But between the death of the testaor and the falling in of the life estate, the two sons, Robert and Philemon Waters had died, leaving (either one or both) issue. The daughter, Mary B. (now the wife of Phillip Schoppert,) alone survived.

Her bill is brought to adjust her interests in the proceeds of the slaves sold by the executor; and to have a settlement made on her. And for these purposes her husband is made a defendant, together with the executor and the heirs of the deceased brothers, &cc. All parties in interest are before the Court.

By decree of the Circuit Court, it was adjudged that she, as sole surviving child of Philemon Berry Waters, was entitled, in exclusion of the children of her brothers Robert and Philemon; and that the fund should be divided equally between herself, William Gillam and James Gillam, each taking one-third; and that her third should be settled as prayed.

This is an appeal by the children of the plaintiff's two brothers; in which they contend that in the construction of the testaor's will, the three children of Philemon Berry Waters, who were all living at his (testator's) death, should have been held to have taken vested remainder in the slaves, limited upon the death of Elizabeth Gillam; and that the share of each of those who had died during her life, should have been distributed to his children.

On examination of the words of the will, it is the unanimous opinion of this Court, that the construction put upon them by the Chancellor, on circuit, was correct.

What might have been the effect of the will as to the survivorship among the children of Philemon Berry Waters if it had been stated and shown that he had had other children in his lifetime, and that the three named in the pleadings were the only ones who survived him, it is not necessary to consider. My opinion is, rather, that on proof of such a state of the family, the testator would have been held to have referred to it, and that the three children surviving him (Waters) would have been adjudged to have taken vested interests, as acertained persons, under the will. If so, their interests would have been transmissible, and the children of Robert and Philemon would have taken their parent's share.

Parol proof may always be received of the circumstances by which a testator is surrounded at the time he attests his will; and those circumstances will always be allowed an influence in the interpretation of dubious words or phrases in it; though they cannot be resorted to prove the testator's intention, apart from his language.(a)

It is a pretty obvious inference from this this(sic) doctrine, that, as surrounding circumstances may be resorted to for the construction of a testamentary paper, the same words or phrases, occurring in different wills, will receive different interpretations, according to the diversity of circumstances under which the several testators composed their testaments.

It is probable, therefore, that if Philemon Berry Waters had been shewn to have had a larger

number of children than the three whom he left behind him, the testator would have been held to have spoken of these three as his surviving children, meaning thereby to speak not of a survivorship among these children, but of their being survivors of their father.

But it was admitted and agreed on at the hearing, and has been again admitted and insisted on here on the argument of this appeal, that Robert Philemon and Mary were the only children the father ever had; and, therefore, there is no room left for the interpretation to which I have referred.

There are but two other modes suggested, of construing the words surviving children of Philemon Berry Waters: to construe them as meaning such children as survived the testator; or as meaning such of them as survived the life tenant, and were in esse to take at the period of distribution.

The case of Cripps v. Woolcott, 4 Madd. 11(b), would seem to decide this point, generally. It is held in that case that words of survivorship are to be referred to the period of division and enjoyment, unless the contrary intent be especially shewn.

There is nothing in the will in this case to shew an intention at variance with the rule that the survivorship relates to the period of distribution. On the contrary, there is much on the face of the will to help the rule.

It seems plain from the testator's language that he looked to changes to take place, during the life estate, both as to the property and as to the persons to whom it was to go in remainder. As to the former, it may be observed that the increase of the property is taken into consideration by the testator. This may be admitted to be but a very slight circumstance. But the expressions in relation to a change in the persons to take in remainder are far from being slight or unimportant. The testator directs the division to be made equally between his two sons, William and James, or their heirs, and the surviving children of Philemon Berry Waters, deceased. Here it seems plain that he contemplated the possibility of the death of his two sons; and that he intended to provide for it by declaring that their interests should be transmitted to their heirs. It is not fair to presume that the testator had in view the possible deaths of Waters' children, and employed the term surviving in reference to that event? If he had intended that their shares should be transmissible, like those of his sons, why did he not direct, as in the case of his sons, that their heirs should take in their place(sic.)? Taking the whole clause together, it seems pretty clear, that on the death of the sons during the life-estate their interests should be transmitted to their heirs, and, on the death of any of the children of Waters, his or her interests should be transmitted not to his or her heirs, but to such of the other children as should survive the life-tenant.

There are other reasons for this construction to be gathered from the will. The mother of these children had married a second husband. It appears by the will that the testaor gave her but twenty dollars. Whether he conceived that he already fully provided for her, or was displeased with her second marriage, or whatever may have been his motive, it seems not unreasonable to conclude that he intended the provision made by him for the children of her first marriage to enure exclusively to their advantage, and not to her or her second family.

The children of Waters were of very tender age, and he may have supposed it improbable that his widow (on whose life he suspended their intersts,) already an old woman, should live to the advanced period to which her life was protracted; or that the infant children of Waters would, during her life, have families or children of their own, to take in case of their death. His probable conclusion was that the best means of saving any portion of their interests from going over to the Sheppards was to limit it to the survivors among themselves, at the death of his widow.

It is ordered that the decree be affirmed and the appeal dismissed.

DUNKIN, DARGAN and WARDLAW, CC., concurred. Appeal dismissed.

Friendship Baptist Church was founded in 1765 making it the oldest Baptist church in Spartanburg County. No records prior to 1801 are known to have survived. Located in Spartanburg County, and very near the Union County line, you will find members there from both counties. This book includes the complete transcript of the church minutes, listings of church members and officers, and an inventory of the cemetery. It is a soft bound book consisting of 193 pages of text and a full name index.

Unlike other cemetery books, this one is crafted to meet the genealogist's needs by paying special attention to the plot and row arrangement of the graves. It presents transcripts of 58 Spartanburg County cemeteries in their entirety. Among the churches presented are Philadelphia Baptist, Bethesda Baptist, Concord Methodist, Mount Carmel Methodist, New Hope Methodist, and North Pacolet Presbyterian. In all, 21 churches, including 7 extinct ones, are published. Also, 34 family cemeteries, and 3 community and private cemeteries appear here.

This is a complete listing of 1866-1869 marriages found in THE CAROLINA SPARTAN, a Spartanburg. South Carolina newspaper. Although these marriages are found in Spartanburg newspapers, they are not confined to that area. Many pertain to persons living in other counties of South Carolina and a few concern persons living in other states.

The Descendants of James Crook and Related Families 1746-1978, compiled and edited by Martha King Neubauer 463 pages, including 63 page index \$50.00

The society has acquired the 28 remaining copies of this detailed study of the James Crook family of Virginia and later Spartanburg County, S.C. However, the late Mrs. Neubauer did not limit this work to this particular family. She included information on other branches of the Crook family in England and America. She also included pictures of tombstones and various Crook homes. The second part includes information on the following related families: Anthony, Bane, Barry, Brockman, Burk, Coleman, Evins, King, Mann, Newman, Patton, Stallworth, Travis, and White families. "Bits and Pieces" (Part III) is an abstract from records of persons of the same surname, but with whom no proof of relationship had been established.

The 1820 Census, Chester District, South Carolina, compiled by Faye Berry. 31 pages, soft cover.

Faye Berry has abstracted the information found in the 1820 federal census for the over 1,500 families then living in Chester District. (Included in this volume are 14 families headed by 'free persons of colour.') This volume eliminates the need of sitting in front of a microfilm viewer to find your ancestor's family here in 1820. It is a great research aid presented in a easy to use size and format.

The History of Mount Zion Church and Her People, by Dr. J.B.O. Landrum, edited by Joseph R. Gainey 17 pages plus index, soft cover.

This is a republication of a 1885 volume on Mount Zion Baptist Church, near Inman, Spartanburg County, S.C. It traces the church from its establishment as a mission of Bethlehem Baptist in 1804, through it organization in 1827, up to the history's publication in 1884. This volume, though small in size, contains a wealth of information, both historical and genealogical, on Mount Zion and its early members.
