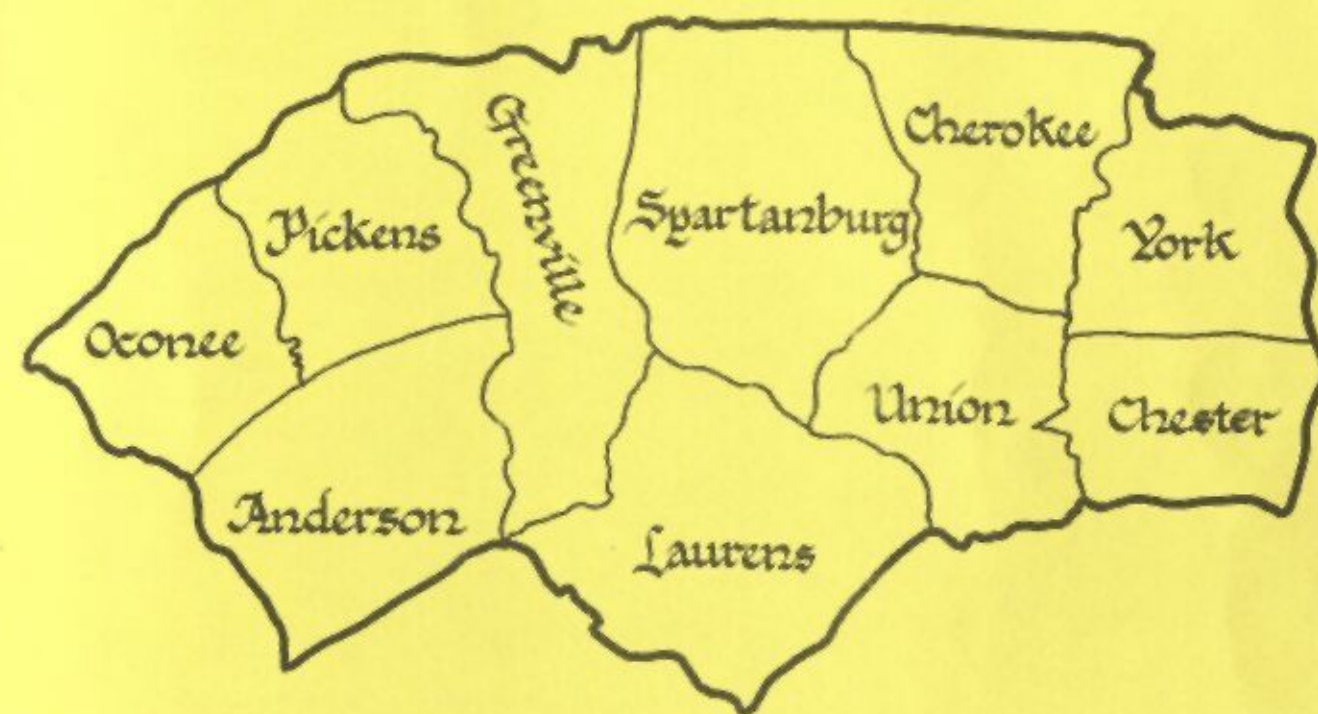

## OLD PINCKNEYVILLE

A paper read before the Fair Forest Chapter D.A.R.

(Written in 1919)

Editor's Note: The following article is found in a collection of WPA materials entitled Illustrated Readings in South Carolina History at the South Caroliniana Library, University of South Carolina, Columbia, SC 29208. It is printed here by permission. The WPA copied this article from the author's manuscript.

"When time who steals our years away  
Shall steal our pleasures too  
The mem'ry of the past will stay,  
And half our joys renew."

In this day of automobiles, interesting trips are taken to battlegrounds and other historic spots off the railroad. It has been a pleasure to visit Pinckney, and gather data for the unwritten history of Union County, South Carolina, which is the work of the Fair Forest Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, for 1916 and 1917.

According to Ramsey, in 1789, the circuit courts of South Carolina were made beneficial and convenient by being invested with complete original and final jurisdiction. In 1791 it became necessary to make two additional circuit courts, and thus Pinckney and Washington were added to the other seven districts of Beaufort, Charleston, Georgetown, Orangeburg, Camden, Cheraw and Ninety-Six. Pinckney District, named in honor of Charles Cotesworth Pinckney, was formed out of Spartanburg and Union of the Ninety-Six District and York and Chester of Camden District. It is said that Gen. Edward Lacy, Baylis Earle and Col. William Farr were appointed by the State Legislature to locate the site for Pinckney Court House. They selected a spot in the Northwestern portion of Union County, about 16 miles from Union, where River empties into Broad. The hanging ground was a mile from the village, and it is known that one horse thief was hanged there. In 1798, the nine circuit courts having proved inadequate and the county courts also unsatisfactory, the judicial system of the State was revised. The nine districts were abolished and circuit courts beginning with 1800, when the new law went into effect, were held in every county. Thus Union has been the county seat of Union County since 1800.

When the people settled at Pinckney - in old times called Pinckneyville - they laid out the village by a certain plan and named the streets for Charleston Streets. In the deed where Elizabeth Bankhead sold nine lots in Pinckneyville to Thomas C. Taylor in 1809, the following streets were mentioned: Meeting, Broad, Water, Tradd, etc. It was expected that Pinckney would be a commercial metropolis of upper South Carolina, and residences and stores were built accordingly. It is said that a committee of Congressmen visited Pinckneyville, as well as Great Falls,



Chester County, with a view to establishing the United States Military Academy, and West Point, New York, won by one vote.

In 1797 there was an act passed by the Legislature bestowing a charter on Alexander College, named for the distinguished educator and minister of the gospel, Dr. Joseph Alexander, who was the first pastor of Bullock's Creek Church, in York County, South Carolina, a short distance on the other side of Broad River. The college was to be located at Pinckneyville, and occupied the attention of Presbytery, but it was not established. There was a log school house at Pinckneyville. The Eaves family lived near it. There was no church in the village. The people attended Bullock's Creek and Mount Tabor - both Presbyterian Churches. Rev. Robert Y. Russell preached at Mount Tabor 40 or 50 years.

A sketch of Pinckneyville would be incomplete without mentioning the McMahan family. The founder of the family was Daniel McMahon, who was born in Coleraine, Ireland, in 1765. He came to the United States in 1783 and peddled jewelry and such things from Philadelphia and back to South Carolina. He walked to Philadelphia and back a dozen times with his pack, and when he could afford it, bought a carry-all and horse. On his thirteenth trip he was robbed of \$500 in gold at Smith's Ford on Broad River, which caused him to have to go to walking again. The was also a counterfeiter who lived in a cave on the border of North and South Carolina, so when a posse would come to arrest him in Rutherford County he would run over to South Carolina, and vice versa.

Daniel McMahon settled at Pinckneyville in 1804. In 1813 George Plexico, Capt. William Palmer and Isaac J. Foster were appointed by the Legislature to appraise and value the public land in Pinckneyville, where the courthouse and jail were erected, part of which land being occupied by Daniel McMahan(sic.), Thomas C. Taylor and Amos Davis. Daniel McMahon bought the courthouse which he fitted up for a dwelling. He married Miss Margaret Kincaid of Fairfield. The Pinckney property remained in the possession of the McMahon family until 1878 when Miss Mary McMahon sold it to the late B. F. Foster, whose son, F. B. Foster, owns it at the present day. In the deed Miss McMahon reserved the minerals on the land. There is a gold mine two or three hundred yards back of the brick store. The Court House, as before mentioned, was the residence of the McMahan family, and was burned in 1871 or 1872. It was a wooden building, and it is said when remodeled made a comfortable home. The old people remember the beautiful flower yard and Summer House with its climbing roses. Daniel McMahan died there in 1846. He and other members of the family were buried at Bullock's Creek. A portion of the inscription on Daniel McMahon's tombstone is: "Whose long life was strictly moral, and whose acts of liberality proved him the friend and supporter of Christianity." He left several sons and daughters. Dr. John J. McMahan lived in Fairfield, and Dr. Daniel F. McMahan moved to Florida after the home was burned. Dr. D. F. McMahan married Miss Eliza Hoey. Miss Frances McMahan married Dr. O. B. Irvine. They lived at Pinck-

neyville for some years and afterwards moved to Greenville. Miss Mary McMahan spent her last years in Greenville. The Stewart family lived near the McMahan family. Some of them moved to Florida.

Across the street from Daniel McMahan lived Thomas C. Taylor, another Irishman, who kept the hotel. Records show that these two sons of Erin had several lawsuits about lines and titles to property. A neighbor had a pair of oxen named McMahan and Taylor because he said they would not pull together. Before Taylor died he requested that his body be buried in front of the McMahan place so that Daniel McMahan would have to see his grave every day. The lonely and solitary grave is still in full view. The inscription on his tombstone is as follows: "Sacred to the memory of Thomas C. Taylor who was born in Ireland, March, 1776, and died in Pinckneyville, South Carolina, 19th June, 1832, in the 57 year of his age."

"Silent grave, to thee I trust

This precious part of worthy dust,

Keep it safe, O sacred tomb,

Until a Wife shall ask for room."

However, his wife, Elizabeth Taylor, does not rest beside her husband. She moved to Dallas County, Alabama, and in 1839, through her attorney, Capt. James Fowler Walker, sold lots in Pinckneyville containing five acres, to William McGowan, who was living there at that time. The witnesses to the deed were G. M. Plexico and James H. Alexander. Squire James E. Alexander was a merchant, and for years a magistrate at Pinckneyville. He and Capt. James F. Walker were brothers-in-law, having married the daughters of William Reid. Capt. J. F. Walker was the grandfather, and William Reid the great-grandfather of the present writer and her brother, William Reid Walker. Robert Black was another merchant of the village.

The Taylor house was occupied by Congressman Joseph Gist before he built his home a mile from the village. The latter place was afterwards the home of the late J. C. Farrar. William F. Gist was a merchant in Pinckneyville in 1805 and in 1821 was one of the justices of the quorum for Union District. Districts have been called counties since 1868. Isaac Going was one of the justices of the quorum in 1828. Judge William Smith lived for a time at Pinckneyville and afterwards moved to Alabama. An old letter states that Judge Grimke held court at Pinckneyville in 1796. In "Bay's Reports" can be found the case of Ferdinand De Greffenreid, Pinckneyville District, 1798. Judge Bay presided on the trial.

At one time Thomas E. Suggs, the clock vender, lived in the Taylor House. He came from Waterbury, Connecticut. His clocks had wooden wheels and works, were considered good timepieces, could be placed on the mantel, and were made at the Waterbury



Clock factory at Bullock's Creek. In after years Suggs moved to Alabama.

It may not be amiss to mention that Seth Thomas, of Plymouth, Litchfield County, Connecticut, owned six acres of lots in Pinckneyville, and sold them to Capt. James Fowler Walker in 1847, who afterwards sold them to Dr. W. H. Sims. Dr. Sims owned and lived in the Taylor House for 8 or 10 years. He sold it to the late B. F. Foster, who lived there before moving to Union, and whose son, as before mentioned, now owns the site of Pinckneyville.

The Taylor House is in ruins. It was a two story wooden building and was put together with wooden pegs. Part of what was a boarding house has been moved across the street and is used as a barn. The only landmarks left of this almost deserted village are two brick buildings - the old jail and the store - the latter said to have been built by Daniel McMahan. Both [of] these have been fitted up for tenant houses and are occupied by Darneille McMahan and family - descendants of the McMahan negroes. The jail is rather interesting. The brick wall of the room is 18 inches thick and the size of the room is 14 feet by 20 feet. It is plastered inside and has two windows and two doors. The shutters and doors are double planked and thick with nails well clinched. There is a chimney at one end of the room, and the two spaces between the fireplace and the walls were planked up and used as dungeons. These two dark cells would be closets if they had doors. They measure two feet by four. It is said criminals were lowered from the top.

On May 28, 1801, "The Times", of Charleston, gives an interesting notice of William Buford's trip from his home on Broad River near Pinckney Court House through the Santee Canal to Charleston. He passed down Broad River, through the canal at Columbia, down the Congaree and Santee, through the Santee Canal, and landed in Charleston on Cooper River. Mr. Buford went in his own boat, which was built on his own plantation, she loaded with his own cotton. This was a great achievement and is the first mention of boating in this country.

Mills says Broad River was navigable to the Ninety-nine Islands for boats carrying 60 bales of cotton - that the obstruction at Lockhart Shoals was overcome by a canal with seven locks executed by the State. Benjamin F. Logan and John McEntin owned a cotton house in Pinckneyville in 1828.

Stage Coaches took the place of trains in those days, and ran rain or shine. They drove four horses to the Coach, and changed horses every 10 miles. They carried mail as well as passengers and their luggage. The driver would blow one long, distinct blast on the York side approaching Pinckney Ferry as a warning, and after that a short blast for each passenger, so the innkeeper at Pinckney would know how many guests to expect. It is said on good authority that the chickens became so accustomed to being chased immediately after the stage horn's daily blast [that] they would run for their lives when they heard it.

It is sad to think of the changes that have befallen Pinckney since those good old days. After the courthouse was moved to

Union and the tide of travel has changed when railroads took the place of stage coaches through the country, Pinckney went into a decline from which it never recovered. From a once thriving village it is left to a lonely fate.

"So sleeps the pride of former days,  
So Glory's thrill is o'er;  
And hearts that once beat high for praise  
Now feel that pulse no more."

## PHILLIP CHAMBERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA

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According to family tradition, Phillip Chambers was born in England, emigrated to America, resided for a time in Maryland or Virginia and served as a nurse in the Revolutionary War (a). Research to date can neither prove or disprove this tradition. Family tradition also states that Phillip married Salome Clubb and that Phillip "reared" 17 children (a). Research has confirmed Phillip's marriage to Salome Clubb and has identified some of Phillip's children. Census records suggest that Phillip was born ca. 1740-50, but his place of birth is unknown.

At this time, verifiable documentation is lacking on Phillip Chambers prior to 1790. However, the following facts must be considered as the basis of a working hypothesis, as these facts conform to family traditions and current findings:

1. The 1776 Maryland state census lists a Phillip Chambers and family residing in Anne Arundel Co (b), but this family does not appear in the 1778 Maryland state census.
2. The Rowan Co, North Carolina Tax List includes a Phillip Chambers (c).
3. The Minute Book, 1778, Rowan Co, North Carolina, includes a Phillip Chambers as a signer of an Oath of Allegiance (d).
4. The birth dates and places of certain of Phillip's children (see below) reveal the following:
  - a. Mahala "Haley" (Chambers) Hughes -- born ca. 1770 MD
  - b. Mary "Mollie" (Chambers) Sanford -- born ca. 1774-75 NC
  - c. Priscilla (Chambers) Sanford -- born ca. 1782 NC
  - d. Jeanette Chambers (unmarried) -- born ca. 1790 SC
  - e. Barak Chambers -- born 1792 SC

The preceding facts considered within the context of unverified family traditions and current findings suggest the following working hypothesis. Phillip resided in MD in 1770, as evidenced by the birth date and place of his daughter Haley. He may have resided in MD as late as 1776 (b). Mollie's birth date may be incorrect, as she may have been born ca. 1776-78 NC. Nonetheless, Phillip moved from MD to Rowan Co, NC no later than 1778, as evidenced by the tax list (c) and the Minute Book (d). He definitely resided in NC in 1782, as evidenced by the birth date and place of his daughter Priscilla. Phillip moved from NC to Union District, SC no later than 1790.

Phillip resided in Union District, SC in 1790 (e), with his wife Salome and up to four sons and five daughters. On 11 Mar 1790, Phillip sold 125 acres of land to Bartlet Wharton. This indenture references "Phillip Chambers and Salomes his wife" (f). On 7 May 1793, Phillip Chambers purchased land in Union District,



SC from Bartlet Wharton (g). Phillip moved to Greenville District, SC, where he resided in 1800 (h), with his wife and up to five sons and four daughters. Phillip moved to Pendleton District, SC no later than Nov 1813, where he is listed on the 6 Nov 1813 Chauga (Shoal Creek) Baptist Church membership roll (j). The membership roll also lists Phillip's son Barak, his probable daughters Jennette and Kezia, as well as a Henry Chambers and a Lucy Chambers, who have not been identified. Phillip's wife Salome is not listed.

In Nov 1813 Phillip Chambers, Jr sold three tracts of land in Greenville District, SC (k). While several of Phillip's children are not yet identified, there is little evidence that Phillip named a son Phillip, Jr. Moreover, research has found no evidence of another Phillip Chambers living in SC from 1790 through 1830. One can only speculate that Phillip, Jr. was in fact a son of Phillip's or that Phillip himself was a junior and these three land deeds as such. However, Phillip did not sign the 1793 Union District indenture as junior, and the 1816 Pendleton District land deed makes no reference to junior.

On 4 Nov 1816 Phillip Chambers purchased 200 acres of land on the southside of the Chauga Creek waters of the Tugaloo River in Pendleton District, SC (l). Also, the Oct 1818 entry in the Chauga [Baptist] Church Record states:

"The church took in to consideration the gift of Brother Phillip Chambers as a public speaker. They tollerate him to exercise his gift in any way he feels an impression in the bounds of this church and the sister churches around and conclude by singing and prayer." (j)

Perhaps Phillip became a minister for a time. It should be noted that Phillip's son Barak was a Baptist minister and that several of Phillip's grandchildren were Baptist ministers.

Phillip resided in Pendleton District, SC in 1820 (m), with his wife and up to two sons and two daughter. An 1826 entry in the Chauga Church Record refers to "our old brother Chambers" and cites his nonattendance, and the April 1827 entry "receives brother Chambers acknowledgement for his nonattendance and grants letters of dismission for him and his wife" (j). Phillip is presumably the "old brother Chambers." The final reference to Phillip is in the 1830 Pickens District, SC census (n).\* Therein, he appears to be a widower with up to two sons and two daughters residing in his household. Phillip does not appear in the 1840 census, and it is assumed he died ca. 1830-40 in Pickens District, SC.

Phillip may have married two or three times. A reference to Phillip's daughter Priscilla, born ca. 1792 NC, states that

\*Phillip did not move from Pendleton District, SC (1820) to Pickens District, SC (1830). In 1826 Pendleton was divided into two new districts: Pickens and Anderson. In 1868 Pickens District was further divided into a new and smaller Pickens County, and Oconee County. Phillip resided in the present day Oconee Co., SC from ca. 1813 to 1830. Also, SC "counties" were called "districts" until after the Civil War. [Author's note]

Priscilla was the daughter of "Phillip Chambers, and wife, a Miss Suggs" (o). If this reference is correct, then Salome Clubb is Phillip's second wife.

Family tradition states that Phillip Chambers married Salome Clubb (a), the 1790 Union District, SC indenture references "Phillip Chambers and Salomes his wife" (f), and Phillip's sons John (born ca. 1788) and Barak (born 1792) named daughters Salome Clubb. It is certain that Phillip married Salome Clubb and that she is the mother of John and Barak, but it is not certain that she is the mother of Phillip's older children.

Interestingly, Salome is not listed on the 1813 Chauga Church membership roll, which includes, Phillip, his son Barak, and his probable daughters Jeanette and Kezia (j). The 1810 Greenville District, SC census suggests that Phillip was married (i), but Salome may have died prior to 1813. Indeed, Salome's death may have precipitated Phillip's move from Greenville District to Pendleton District. If Salome died prior to 1813, then Phillip married a third time. Both the 1820 Pendleton District, SC census (m) and the Apr 1827 Chauga Church Record (j) suggests that Phillip was married. If Phillip had a third marriage ca. 1810-14 to a younger woman, then one Spencer Chambers (born ca. 1814 SC) may be Phillip's youngest child.

According to family tradition (a), "Phillip and Salome Chambers reared 17 children." All of these "reared 17 children" may not have been Phillip's, as some could have been grandchildren. An analysis of census records (e, h, i, m, n) suggests that Phillip had no more than five or six sons and six daughters. However, certain of Phillip's older sons and daughters may have left Phillip's household prior to the 1790 Union District, SC census (e).

To date, all of Phillip's children have not been identified. Nonetheless, even with the absence of a will or a family Bible, overwhelming evidence asserts that John and Barak are sons of Phillip and Salome Clubb Chambers. Additionally, although the evidence is not as extensive as in the case of John and Barak, there is compelling evidence that Mollie and Priscilla are daughters of Phillip's, but not necessarily of Salome Clubb's. Finally, the evidence supports the probability that James, Jennette, Haley, Keziah and Nancy are children of Phillip Chamber's. By way of summary, the identified children of Phillip Chambers are as follows:

1. Barak Chambers - b Feb 1792 Union District, SC - d 7 Feb 1847 Pickens District, SC - res Pendleton/Pickens Districts, SC - married Agnes Sanford - 10 children.
2. John Chambers - b ca. 1788 NC or SC - d after 1850 - resided Pendleton/Pickens Districts, SC - married Julia Ann Sanford - 9 children.

8. Jennette Chambers - b ca. 1790 SC - died after 1850 - resided Pendleton/Pickens Districts, SC - unmarried.
9. Kezia Chambers -, b ca. 1795 SC - died after 1870 - resided Pendleton/Pickens Districts/ Oconee County, SC - unmarried.

It is interesting to note that four of Phillip's children married into the Sanford family. It is probable that Agnes, Bill, Hezekiah and Julia Ann Sanford are siblings or are otherwise closely related. To date, extensive research efforts have failed to identify this Sanford family, but they resided in Greenville District, SC prior to 1790. It is assumed that Phillip Chamber's children married into the Sanford family while Phillip resided in Greenville District. A high priority has been placed on researching this Sanford line in the future.

Census records and other sources suggest that the names of Phillip Chamber's additional children might be Henry, Phillip, Sarah, Spencer, and William. The assertion of these individuals as Phillip's children is certainly capable (in varying degrees) of being factual by the evidence, but the evidence is not compelling enough at this time to make such an assertion. The most enigmatic of these individual is Spencer Chambers, who was born in SC ca. 1814. Spencer married Nancy Johnson, and they had ten children. Spencer died after 1880 and is buried in the Holly Springs Baptist Church cemetery. Spencer was the most involved member of the Chambers family. Phillip's son James and daughters Jennette and Kezia resided in Spencer's household in 1850. Also, Spencer purchased land from Phillip's son Barak, was involved in the settlement of Barak's estate, and was an active member of the Holly Springs Baptist Church. There is more documentation on Spencer Chambers than on any other family member, but there is no evidence suggesting his parents. Spencer is too young to be a child of Phillip's and Salome's, but he is possibly Phillip's youngest child, if Phillip married a third time (as briefly discussed above). Perhaps Spencer is Phillip's grandson through one of Phillip's hitherto unidentified sons.

# 46th ANNUAL WYATT REUNION IS PLANNED SUNDAY AT SHOALS JUNCTION NEAR DONALDS

The 46th annual Wyatt reunion will be held next Sunday at historic Greenville Presbyterian church at Shoals Junction near Donalds in Greenwood County.

Some 2,000 persons are expected to attend the Wyatt reunion, combined with the allied and associated family reunions of the families of Agnew, Haddon, Johnson, Purdy, Stewart, Wardlaw, Brownlee, Jarvis, Miller, Richey, Swain, Wilson, Rasor, LaBoon, Pharr, Seawright, Smith, Wier, Sharp and Webb.

The affair began as a Wyatt project when they decided to mark the graves of 16 Revolutionary War soldiers who were connected with the family and to raise money and buy similar markers for their wives. The other families soon joined in.

A total of 30 official government markers have been erected at the graves and markers erected at the graves of their wives. All will be unveiled in a tableau-pageant with 400 persons taking part. Of that number, 240 will be children dressed in white and wearing three ribbon sashes of red, white and blue. All of them are direct descendants of the soldiers.

More than 25 people from Columbia will take part in the tableau pageant. More than 500 descendants of the soldiers live in Columbia and the rest will come from 26 states.

The Greenville church furnished 75 soldiers in the Revolution. Fifty of them are buried there, but the families of the other 20 are not taking part in the ceremony.

Among those who will participate in the pageant are the state regent of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the national president-general of the DAR.

A special feature of the program will be the unveiling of a new marker to take the place of a broken marker for Mrs. Redmond Grigsby Wyatt (Elizabeth D. Richey). She died 110 years ago on August 12, 1842. Today she has seven living grandchildren and all are over 80 years old. They will unveil the marker.

The different families will have reunions and place their picnic baskets at the same tables. The public also has been invited and use a nearby wayside park. The state highway patrol will direct traffic.

The Star Fort chapter of the DAR of Greenwood will decorate all the graves of the soldiers whose markers they sponsored. The Hudson Berry chapter of the DAR of Anderson will decorate graves of those sponsored by them, and the Fort Charlotte chapter, DAR, will form a guard of honor for the flag. The American Legion post of Ware Shoals will form the main guard of honor for the celebration.

All DAR chapters in South Carolina and adjacent areas in Georgia have been invited to send official delegates for the day.

Special guests invited are Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, who has Revolutionary ancestors buried at Greenville church. Gen. and Mrs. W.P. Shepard of Fort Jackson were invited.



Mrs. Wendell Wilkie, of Rushville, Ind., has three ancestors buried at the church and her son, Phillip H. Willkie, was invited to speak. He is to be introduced by former Gov. J. Strom Thurmond whose wife is a cousin of Mr. Wilkie.

C.R. Smith, president of Continental Air Lines of Texas and New York and Mr. and Mrs. Robert McDonald Lester of New York were asked to attend. Mr. Lester is secretary of the Carnegie Foundation. His wife and Mr. Smith both have ancestors in the churchyard.

Leonardo Andrea of Columbia is chairman of the program committee for the reunion.

In connection with the meeting, Greenville church will be celebrating the 190th anniversary of its founding on June 15, 1762. It was organized as Saluda meeting house by families from Maryland, Pennsylvania, Virginia, North Carolina, Scotland and Ireland. Many Revolutionary relics will be on display.

Services will begin in the church at 10:30 Sunday morning. The people will then march into the cemetery for the tableau-pageant unveiling at 11 o'clock and at 1 o'clock the various families will set their dinner tables.

The afternoon program is to be given over to different family reunions. It is planned to raise money to furnish a Memorial Room of the Revolution in the new parish house being built there.

The soldiers who will be honored are Samuel Agnew and wife Elizabeth Seawright; George Brownlee and wife Sarah Caldwell; Samuel Cross and wife, Elizabeth Finly; James Dunn and wife, Agnes Agnew; Robert Haddon and wife, Jane Ross Lindsey; Robert Haddon, Jr., and wife, Jean Seawright; Francis Johnson and wife, Margaret Seawright.

Pierre LeBon landed at Georgetown with LaFayette. After the war, he liked South Carolina and came here to live with his family. He married Anne Gervais in Rochefort, France and they had four children. He was a gunsmith and the tools he brought

from France are in Walton County, Georgia, where descendants also have his inkstand and his spectacles.

Need parents of Thomas T. Byars, born ca 1835, also need his place of birth. He wed 16 May 1858, Harriet Eushelia Jeter, daughter of Richard Crosby Jeter of Union Co., SC. They lived and raised a large family in the Wilkesburg area of Chester Co., SC where he operated a store and was postmaster. They were members of Brushy Fork Baptist and are buried in the church cemetery.

Need children of Richard Crosby Jeter (1799-ca1869) and wife, Augusta Ann Johnson, daughter of Col. Wm. Johnson of Union Co., SC. Our Kin, a Jeter family history, does not list the children. ## BOOK REVIEWS

Our Way of Life by Ryon A. Page. This book may be purchased from Mr. Page by writing him at 10702 Edgewood Ave., Silver Spring, MD 20901. Paperback, 193 pages including full name index, \$6.15.

This book tells the story of the Page family of Spartanburg County. However, it is not a genealogy. It is a family history which relates the day to day life of a farming family in the late 1800s and early 1900s. A very informative volume, this book gives details of rural life which cannot be remembered by many and would have been lost had they not been documented by Mr. Page. Although limited to his family, Our Way of Life is not limited in its appeal to Page descendants. It is of use to any student of Southern farm life and customs.

This book contains a genealogical appendix on the Page, Turner, Atkins and other families. Mr. Page writes us that he will be glad to share the results of his research on these and his other lines (Perkins, White (of Jersey City, NJ), Robinson of MD., Hines, etc.) with any interested party.

Mobile County, Alabama Marriage Records compiled by the Mobile Genealogical Society, PO Box 6224, Mobile, AL 36660. Price not given.

This is volume one of a series which will publish the marriages found recorded in the records of the probate court in Mobile. The years 1813 through 1850 are covered by this volume and many Piedmont surnames are found therein. All of the marriages are arranged alphabetically by both bride and groom. Hence an index is unnecessary. This volume is a great aid to those researching the southern part of Alabama. I highly recommend it.

All Known Cemeteries in Fayette County, Georgia: a Genealogically Oriented Survey by Joel Dixon Wells and Donald R. Schultz. Order from ArmChair Publications, 810 McDonough Rd., Hampton, GA 30228. Soft cover, 190 pages including index. \$15.00

This is a complete survey of all known cemeteries (white and black) in Fayette County—97 in all. Not only are all the cemeteries copied in full by the editors have made efforts to identify unmarked graves and correct errors found on the tombstones. Also, the graves are presented in the order they are found as one walks through the cemetery. This massive undertaking, which was completed only 2 years, is a great boon to those with relatives in this section of Georgia. The editors have done a great work but it is sad to note that they omitted directions to these cemeteries "as a result of numerous requests by the current owners of property on which cemeteries are located. Judging from the amount of vandalism which had already occurred in a number of the cemeteries we visited, we believe it best not to reveal locations. . . . a sad commentary on the times." How true.

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
