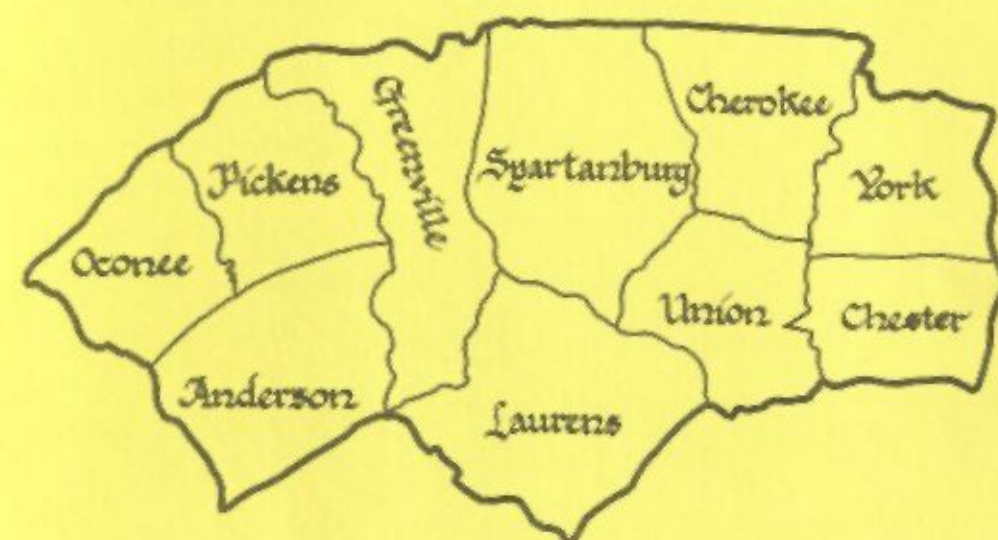

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PRESIDENT'S PAGE

Dear Members,

In 1984, the South Carolina State Supreme Court in the case of The Society of Professional Journalists v. Joel S. Sexton, 324 S.E.2d 313 (S.C. 1984) ruled that death records in the possession of the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) are public records which may be used for legitimate research under South Carolina's Freedom of Information Act. One can include genealogy as a subject in which legitimate research is conducted. Unfortunately, DHEC refuses to open the records on the local level and charges a user's fee (charged by the hour) to consult death certificates at the Columbia office AT THEIR CONVENIENCE. This is a dangerous precedent for genealogists. If they can get away with charging a user's fee, soon other bodies which have records may charge for access to them. Can you imagine paying by the hour to use deeds and estate files? That is a distinct possibility if we don't act now. So, write the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, 2600 Bull Street, Columbia, SC 29201 and let them know that you object to them making it difficult and expensive for the public to use records that the law says can be used for free. Also, the Society has petitions available for those of you who wish to circulate them in your area. If you want one, please write me at the Society's address for a copy. Let's all work together to protect our right as citizens, as well as genealogists, to have access to our public records because if the State can prevent us from using these records due to bureaucratic red tape, then they can limit other rights by the same means.

NARRATIVE OF EX-SLAVE WILLIAM PRATT

The following narrative by William Pratt, ex-slave, from Chester County and Newberry County, S.C. Part of the WPA Folklore Project. The interview was done by G.I. Summer, Newberry, S.C. on Sept. 9, 1927 and edited by Elmer Turnage.

I live with my children on a farm in Newberry County. I have a good place to live and plenty to eat. I work on a farm. I moved from Chester County in the year 1896, the year the Spanish-American war started.

I was born in Chester County in April, 1860. My parents belonged to the Pratts, but my mother belonged to the Kennedys before she married. They went to Robert K. Kennedy and was with him as slaves. He was a good man but his wife was mean. She sure could "cuss out" slaves if they made her mad. She whipped me once when I was a small boy. I could'n't do much with her. My daddy's family belonged to the Pratts who lived seven miles from Chester. They were good folks to slaves. They always had lots to eat from their big garden. The white folks went hunting and it was said that some wild turkeys was around Price's Mountain, about nine miles south of Chester.

We got up before day and went to work and worked till sundown. My mammy cooked for the family; and one day the mistress got mad at her and hit her on the head with a coffee paddle. We worked all day on Saturdays but didn't work on Sundays. On Christmas we had a holliday and had frolics and big eats.

The patrollers once caught my daddy out at night without a pass and whipped him a little. just for mischief. He was always allowed to go about where he wanted to go without a pass, but next time he asked Miss Polly for a paper to take out with him.

After the war the Ku Klux Klan did'nt brother us but the Red Shirts come and wanted us to join them, that is they wanted my brother to join. He would'nt join though. My brother-in-law joined and wore one of the shirts with them. He wanted Wade Hampton elected as he believed it was best for us. He was a Democrat and said they all ought to wear them. Once some mischief was played on a negro who was a Republican and voted for Chamberlain. He was given a card and told to go to a certain merchant and show the card to him, that the merchant was a Chamberlain man and would give him supplies. He showed the card to the merchant who got mad and told the negro if he did'nt get out of his store he would kill him.

Some of the old folks sometimes saw ghosts. A negro went to church one night on a horse, and somebody slipped up behind and spurred the horse. The negro went home as fast as he could, saying he saw a ghost.

When freedom come, old man Kennedy took it well and said we was all free, but his wife just cursed us and said, 'Dam You, you are free now'. Old Marse Kennedy had some sons killed in the war. James and Douglas Kennedy lived in Chester County after the war.

We used to dance jigs by ourself, and we danced the Hackback, skipping backwards and forewards facing each other. When one danced a jig he would sing, 'Juber this, Juber that, Juber kills a yellow cat. My brother used to sing a cotton picking song: 'My mammy got meat skin laid away; grease my belly three times a day'.

We was Baptist and baptized by immersion. An old Baptist song that was sung at the baptism was; 'Trouble water today, Trouble water today, Trouble water today. He will save you, he will save you; come to Jesus today, come to Jesus today, come to Jesus today, come to Jesus today. He will save you, he will save you, just now'.

An old wood-chopping song which is yet sung by negroes is: Come on baby, let us go down; come on baby, let us go down; ten pound hammer above my head; 'nough to kill my body dead.

I married Rosy Kennedy, a daughter of Mose Kennedy, and had five children. But only two are now living. I have several grandchildren living in Chester County. I worked first on the Kennedy place. Their daughter, Miss Julie, was good to us. She married Robert Orr of Chester. She did'nt have many beaux before because her mother was so mean nobody wanted to come around her. Miss Julia helped at my wedding. When my wife wasn't able to get breakfast so I could go to work, Miss Julia would tell me to come to her house and eat. This was after her mother died.

I think Abraham Lincoln did'nt do just right, 'cause he threw all the negroes on the world without any way of getting along. They were helpless. He ought to have done it gradually and give them a chance to get on their own. I think Booker Washington is a great man and has done great work, because he says negroes must have education and learn to work, too, and not sit down and expect more because he is educated.

I joined the church because I believe there is a 'here after' and I wanted to learn more about Jesus and get his forgiveness for what I had done wrong. We need him always, because St. Matthew says the last state of man is worse than the first.

WILL OF LEONARD PRATT

The following will was found in the S.C. State Archives in Columbia, SC. Leonard Pratt was the father of Henry Pratt. Henry married Mary Turner on Feb. 3, 1859 in Chester County, SC. Henry died in York County SC on July 30, 1864. He was a farmer & slave owner.

In the name of God Amen

I Leonard Pratt of South Carolina Chester District do make and bequeath this my last will and testament and as for my worldly estate in the following manner that is to Say

1st My will and desite is that all my Just debts and funeral be paid.

2nd. To my beloved wife Anna Pratt she Shall have and keep all her property that she had or is to have from her former husband estate, that is not dead or worn out befor my death Consisting of her tract of Land whereon she lived when married to me also Three Negro Slaves named Harriet Mary and George there in crease if any therebe also all her Cows Sheep and Geese also her mare Blaze and all increase if any there be or is living at the time of my death also to have and Keep all her Household and Kitchen furniture that is not worn out before my death that She owned before she married me also my wife Anna Pratt to have all the money of Legacy that is to us from her mother Nancy Mitchells estate when settled if not done before my death also my will and desire is if my wife Anna Pratt on a final Settlement of her former husbands estate becomes indebted to us She must pay it the debt out of the property She owned before I married her also my will and deisre to my beloved wife Anna Pratt to have out of my estate that I owned before we were Married Five Hundred dollars to be paid to her twelve months after the sale of my property not disposed of by this will bear interest if my wife Anna Pratt dies before She receives Five Hundred it is to go to my estate and be equally divided between my three Children. Also my wife for her Support to have the insuing year after my death Fifty Bushels of Corn Ten Bushels of Wheat Two Hundred Pounds of meat pork or money enough to buy the pork and one Dutch Blanket we cover with and one Sorrel mare named Nell

3rd My will and desire that my daughter Sarah Darby is to have and keep all the property that I have heretofore gave her and She has now in her possession also to Sarah my daughter one Hundren and Thirty acres of land part of a tract called the Calla place Joining the plantation where I now live including the house on the said place Also to my daughter Sarah two negroes Slaves named Deliah and John Also my horse mule named Peter

4th. My will and desire that my daughter Mary C Harden have all that plantation or tract of land called the eiles place containing Seventy four More or less and Thirty three acres of the lower part of the McCaulia place Joining John Atkinsons lands to be run of at the lower part of said tract also two feather beds two bed steads two Bolster four pillars Eight bed Quilts eight Caounter Panes of sheets one Beaureau one Small table two Cows and Calves one called Spot and the other pide Sorrel horse called Paddy One mare mule called cats also One large pine chest. Also to my daughter mary one Negro woman named Harriet and her for children William. Liander Sarah and Mary.

5th My will and desire to my son Henry Pratt all the plantation or tract of land where I now live containing three hundred and fifty five acres also the balance of the mill tract that do not make provision for in this will also To my son Henry six Negroes Slaves named as follows Sam Amzi Thomas Dave Neely and her child named Ellen and her increase also two Feather Beds two Bed Steads two Bolsters four pillars five under Sheets five upper Sheets Ten Bed Quilts and one dutch Blanket one square trunk also Six silver Table spoons. Also one mare named Fan one Mule called Jum also for my son Jenrys Support the year after my death Two hundred bushels of corn Twenty bushels of Wheat Five hundred pounds of pork of meat Fifteen hundred sheaf of fodder. Also to my son Henry Two Hundred dollars to be paid to his at the age of Twenty years with lawful Interest

6th My will and desire that all the money or legucy that is coming to me and my children from the estate of my wife Ursula Pratt decd an heir of Henry Carter Senr decd I want it collected and equally divided between Eursula Pratts three Children named Sarah Darby Mary C Harden and Henry Pratt

7th My will and desire none of my Wearing apparel of any kind be appriased or Sold

8th My will and desire the remander of my estate that I have not give away in this will including part or Forty acres of land around my mill and all my Slaves that I have not named and gave way and any thing else I have not named and gave way I will it be sold at publish Sale and the money after paying the amount gave in the former part of this will the balance to equdly divided between my three children Sarah Darby Mary C Harden and Henry Pratt

9th My reason that I give my son Henry Pratt more of my property than I gave to my two daughters is I have done much more for them in my life time

I also nominate constitute and appoint George A Hooper Sole Guardian of my son Henry Pratt untill he the said Henry Pratt arrives to the age of fourteen years with full authority to rent the plantation hire the negroes and Sell any of his other property that he the said Hooper thinks proper for the welfare of my son Henry Pratt

In testimony whereof I have hereunto Set my hand and Seal this twenty Sixth Day of November in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and forty six Signed Sealed and declared this to be my last will and testament in the presence of us who by the request of Leonard Pratt and in the presence of each other and have subscribed our names there to as Witnesses

MT. LEBANON BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

The following history of Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church in Greenville County, SC was copied from the back of one of the church's Bulletins.

The Mt. Lebanon Baptist Church was organized sometime during the year 1836. There are no available records of the early history of the church. The number of charter members, the exact date of its organization, and the names of its first pastor and deacons are unknown. The only written record of its first 26 years is a deed for two acres of land given by William P. McBee to deacons Stephen Dill, Elias Ward and Joseph Pittman on July 5, 1861. Evidently the church functioned for 26 years without a deed for the land. The church joined the old Greenville Association in 1870. This year began the written history of the church.

Six sanctuaries, all located on the same site, have served as a place of worship for the people of the Mt. Lebanon-Jordan community for 142 years.

The first meeting place of the church was a small log building which stood near the site of our present building. During the next 71 years, two small unpainted frame buildings served in succession as the church's sanctuaries. The first one was probably built in 1861, the year that the land deed was given to the church.

In 1907 the auditorium of a larger frame building was erected at a total cost of \$546.63. As the church's need for space increased, several additions were built to this sanctuary during its 41 years of service. On Jan. 15, 1948, this building and all its furnishings were destroyed by fire.

Sixteen months later, on May 20, 1949, the fifth sanctuary to serve Mt. Lebanon's members was dedicated. The approximate cost of this building, including free labor and materials was \$75,000. The old Jordan school building served as a meeting place during the construction of this building.

On February 6, 1969, twenty years after its dedication, this sanctuary and education facilities suffered the same fate-total destruction by fire. The loss of the sanctuary and educational facilities was estimated at \$250,000.00, excluding the church's furnishings, a valuable church library, all the church's records, and Pastor Simpson's private library. On the following Sunday, the church met at Blue Ridge High School which served as a meeting place during the two years construction period of our new building. Rebuilding plans were formulated during this first meeting at Blue Ridge.

Construction work had already begun on the new church, educational plant and fellowship hall when ground-breaking ceremonies were held on Sunday, Nov. 16, 1969.

M.L. Garrett Construction Company was awarded the \$290,000.00 construction contract for the new building designed by Walker and Farmer, Architects. Adequate space for the 650 seat sanctuary and the thirty-nine room educational plant and fellowship hall is provided in the 28,000 square-foot structure which stands on the site of the five preceeding buildings.

The first service in the new building was on February 21, 1971. The building was dedicated at this service and Open House was held in the afternoon.

In 1939, the first parsonage was built across the road from the church building on an acre of land donated by Mrs. Pearl Fowler. Twenty-six years later, in 1965, our present parsonage was completed on a site near the first one.

Day school for community children was taught in the first three church buildings. Mr. Zera Pittman is recorded as being one of the teachers in the church school.

Our present pastor Rev. Bobby Crocker, began his pastorate in December, 1971.

Reverend W.W. Reece became Mt. Lebanon's first full time pastor in 1946. He was also the first pastor to receive a specified salary. Prior to 1946, the pastor was paid a percentage of the church's contributions. In 1870 the total contribution was \$0.50; in 1890, \$26.52; in 1901, \$36.98; in 1976, \$116,613.70.

In 1893, fifty-seven years after its organization, Mt. Lebanon's membership reached the 100 mark for the first time. A membership of 44, forty-two whites and two colored, was reported for 1870. Mt. Lebanon's membership in September 1978 numbers 748.

The 1978 church roster lists 170 officers, teachers, musicians and committee members who served in Mt. Lebanon's Sunday School, Church Training, W.M.U., R.A.'s, Brotherhood and Vacation Bible School.

Mt. Lebanon Church property which includes 9 acres of land, the sanctuary and educational plant, furnishings, and parsonage has an estimated value of \$625,000.00

BURNT FACTORY CEMETERY

The Brunt Factory or Blackstock cemetery is located near Cross Anchor, SC. From Spartanburg take Hwy 56 south towards Cross Anchor. After crossing Tyger River take the next left, which will be the Cross Anchor Fishcamp Road (no. S-42-115). Go approximately 50 yards and the cemetery is on the left in a grove of pine trees.

Approximately 30 field stones.

Mrs. Matilda Taylor. Died February 3, 1857. Wife of Col. Stephen Taylor. Age 42. "Leaving a husband soon/ to follow her to the grave/ and five small children/ to mourn her loss./ She was a member of the/ Methodist church and a/ dutiful mother and/ neighbor

Mary Fowler. Born January (11?) 182(2?). Died ? Soapstone marker which is now hard to read.

Elisa Smith Kingsmore. 1849-1890. A recent marker.

Four recent plot markers with the initial "K".

Martha Yarbrough. Born June 5, 1839. Died June 28, 1882. Wife of Hiram Yarbrough.
