



ASBURY METHODIST CHURCH; 200 YEARS OF AREA HISTORY

Asbury Methodist Church of Pacolet Route 1, in Cherokee County, recently celebrated its 200th anniversary.

This church is one of the many along the Eastern seaboard to be named for America's first Methodist Bishop, Francis Aubury.

Bishop Asbury was sent to America in 1771 by the founder

of the Methodist Church, John Westly.

Wherever Bishop Asbury preached, in his travels from New England through South Carolina and into Georgia, the "Methodist Meeting Places" became known as "Ausbury's Chapel" or "Ausbury's Church."

Exactly how and by whom Methodism first came into part of South Carolina later to be known as the Broad River Circuit cannot be determined with any degree of accuracy. John Wesley visted Charleston in 1736 and again in 1738. George Whitfield preached in Charleston in 1738 and again in 1740-"to great crowds, there meeting with much prejudice against Methodist in general and against himself in particular."

In 1762, William Marshbanks and William Sims, brothersin-law, came from England to make their homes on a grant of land located in what was destined in later years to become Asbury Community. And a year later, in 1763, these two men built a crude house of worship which they called the Methodist

Meeting House.

In 1785, Asbury made his first trip to South Carolina, stopping in route to Charleston witha Methodist family in what is now Cheraw. In 1787, when South Carolina had its own separate conference for the first time, Broad River Circuit was one of the seven circuits to which appointments were made. That year, 1787, the Rev. John Mason and the Rev. Thomas Davis were appointed to the Broad River Circuit. Thus we know that Methodism had somehow found its was into the "Up Country" and had taken root there some years before Asbury first came to South Carolina in 1785.

We cannot be sure as to the exact date of Asbury's first visit to this community in that the records of this church's early beginnings were destroyed by fire in 1926. One who had read the record for himself, quoting from memory, placed the date as the latter part of 1785 or early 1786. However, Asbury's diary does not record a visit to this section of the state until March of 1788. In all probability, 1788 is the correct date.

As far as specific information about Asbury Church is concerned-or the Broad River Circuit, for that matter-littel is to be found between 1800 and 1900. Sketchy Conference Minutes provide little information beyond the names of the men appointed each year. Special mention is made of the fact that the news of George Washington's death was received while

the conference was in session in 1800. That year William West and Britton Capel were appointed to the Broad River Circuit.

In 1830 Asbury Chapel had become too small to accommodate its membership. In that year, Jack Littlejohn, who had much good timber on his land, suggested that a new church be built. He provided the building materials and other members gave their labor. The new church was built on the present site was a large, one-room affair, with space enough for the slaves to worship along with their owners. Some of the lumber used in this church, built in 1830, is part of the present structure.

From time to time, changes were made in the geographical extent of the Broad River Circuit. As Methodism increased numerically in South Carolina, the few original large circuits were naturally divided into smaller circuits.

The year 1844 marked the time of the great division in the Methodist Episcopal Church, when the Northern and Southern branches divided over the issue of slavery. The Conference Minutes of 1850 make no mention of the Broad River Circuit, but lists the Reverend R.J. Boyd as having been appointed to the Union Circuit which seems to include part of the former Broad River Circuit in which Asbury Church was located.

In 1860 the Minutes tell us that the Reverend Joseph Parker was appointed to the Broad River "Mission". Again, this seems to refer to the area of which Asbury was a part. In the Minutes of 1890 there is no mention of the Broad River Mission-instead, these Minutes record that the Rev. A.A. Gilbert was appointed to the Gaffney Circuit, Asbury then being one of the several churches that made up this circuit. Ten years later, in 1900, we find the Reverend J.N. Isom appointed to the Cherokee Circuit and Asbury is listed among its member churches.

It would not be possible to list accurately all the pastors who ministered to the membership of Asbury Church from 1800 to 1900-even if there were time and space to do so.

Many of these men knew the handicap of inadequate preparation for so great a task. Nevertheless, they held the standard of Christ during a century that experienced a sad division within American Methodism, a war that rocked the very foundation of our country, and are sultant trying period of proverty and national re-organization.

The years 1900 through 1963 have been exciting, resourceful, yet challenging years in the history of Asbury Church.

According to the minutes of the South Carolina Conference, in 1900 Asbury was one of the five members of the Pacolet Circuit, which included Asbury, Lebannon, Pacolet, and Walnut Grove. At this time Asbury had only 57 members. The Reverend S.A. Nettles served as Pastor.

The succeeding twenty-five years brought many changes to Asbury. From approximately 1904 until 1926, Asbury became a member of the Gaffney Circuit which included Asbury, Gethsemane, Mesopotamia, Sardis, and Wilson's Chapel.

In 1927, Asbury became a most inactive church. She was dropped from the Methodist Church's list of appointments, and

became closely associated with Montgomery Memorial Methodist Church at Pacolet Mills. It was at this time that George Becknell, Boyd Becknell, R.L. Parris, and Ed Hall, through their hard work and dedication, helped Asbury to survive.

In 1956 Asbury and Loree were placed on the same charge, and the Reverend Fred Porter was appointed as pastor of these two churches. Another change in 1959 placed Asbury and Fairmont on the same charge, with the Rev. David Holder as pastor. Rev. Holder served through 1961. Then came another change in our church-Asbury became a student appointment, in which young college men who were preparing for the ministry could serve as pastor while continuing their college education.

By action of the 1961 session of the Annual Conference, Asbury was placed on the same charge with Gethsemane. The Reverend Roy Dickerson came at this time as the first of the student pastors. After two years of service he was succeeded by the Reverend Stanley McGraw, present pastor.

Today, Asbury stands proudly, the white steeple tower pointing upwards towards the sky. Each Sunday morning, many of her members walk through the sanctuary to worship God.

Asbury has a full Sunday school and church program. The children's, youth, and adult divisions seek to fulfill the religious needs of its members by providing good literature, teachers, and equipment. The Methodist Men's Club, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Methodist Youth Fellowship are part of the church program.

What's in the future for Asbury Methodist Church? What is planned for the next year-the next century in the Asbury

Community and at the church?

According to the Commemorative Program of the Bicentennial Observance, from which most of the material used in this article was taken, "the furture is a chalenge that, like the challenges of the past 200 years, will be met with faith and courage in a community and a church rooted in the history of our country.

Editor's Note: For persons doing research on the Methodist Churches, in South Carolina, I suggest they contact the archives at the Sandor Teszler Library, Wofford College, Spartanburg, South Carolina 29301. Although not all church records can be found there, this collection does have many records of genealogical value. It is the only depository in South Carolina for the Methodist records.

MOSES McCARLEY'S LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT

The will of Moses McCarley is recorded in Deed book "lA" pp. 245-246, in the Register of Mesne Conveyance office at Spartanburg County Courthouse.

In the name of god Amen I Moses McCarley of the state of South Carolina and District of Ninety six being now seventy seven years of Age Tho of perfect health & sound memory But Calling to mind the Mortallity of man that all must Die Therefore I have thought proper to ordain this my last will and Testament, in manner and form following (that is to say) My will and Desire is that my Just Debts be first paid and as for the Rest of my Estate I give and bequeath as follows----

Item I give and Bequeath unto my son David McCarley, one Hundred Acres of Land Whereon I now live with the Improvements thereof Which said Land I give to him his Heirs and assigns forever; On his the said David's paying Five pounds Virginia Currency in Trade, to my son Abram McCarley and also to pay to my Grand Son Thomas McCarley Ten Pounds like money in Trade To be paid to the said Thomas McCarley, which is son of Abram McCarley When he the said Thomas shall come of age-----

Item I Give and Bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth (Cavin?)
The Feather bed and furniture whereon I and my wife now lies on
Together, with what Pewter I possess to be her Rights and Property, after the Death of my wife-----

Item I Give and Bequeath to my Daughter Jean Hiddleston Three Pounds Virginia Currency to be paid out of my Estate in Trade----

Item I Give & Bequeath to my son James McCarley Three Pounds Virginia money to be Raised out of my Estate and paid in Trade-----

Item And all the Residue of my Estate I give and Bequeath to my loving wife Ruth McCarley & her assigns forever Renouncing all other Wills acknowledging this to be my last Will and Testament. In Witness Whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal the Twenty first day of June AD 1785

Tests John Ford Samuel Ford Spencer Ford Moses McCarley Seal

In Brent Holcomb's <u>Spartanburg County</u>, <u>South Carolina Minutes of the County Court 1785-1799</u>, p. 46 appears the following:

"The will of Moses McCarley was produced in Open Court and proved in the presence of said Court by the Evidences of Samuel and Spencer Fords, to be the said McCarley's last Will and Testament. Ordered to be recorded."

Married on Thursday, the 12th of January, by Rev. H.N. Hays, Mr. Warren D. Moore and Miss Eveline Baldwin, all of Oconee County. By the same, on Thursday, 26th of January, Mr. William Campbell and Miss Mary Cox, all of Oconee County.

By the same, on Thursday, 2nd of Feb. Mr. Wallace Pitts, of Oconee County, and Miss C.C. Patterson, of Anderson County. On the 9th inst. by Rev. S. Isbell, Mr. James A. Weldon, of Hart County, Georgia, and Miss Martha J. Elgin, of Anderson County.

On the 4th ist., by the same, Mr. Franklin Barton, son of Rev. H.N. Barton, and Miss Nancy Isbell, all of Oconee County. On the 22nd of December last, by the same, Mr. Frederick Davis and Miss Eliza J. Maret, all of Oconee County.

March 2, 1871

On Thursday evening, Feb. 23, 1871, by Rev. D.D. Byers, Mr. James Seaborn and Miss Anna Mason, all of Oconee County. On Sunday morning, Feb. 19, 1871, at the residence of the bride's father, by Rev. A. Rice, Mr. Walker W. Higgins and Miss Annie Agnew, all of Abbeville County.

March 9, 1871

Died in Anderson County, S.C. on the 19th of Jan. 1871, Thomas McConnell, in the 84th year of his age. The subject of this notice was born in Newberry County and in 1822 removed to what was then Pendleton District and settled in the neighborhood of Concord Church. Mr. McConnell was a man of more than ordinary intelligence, and the greater part of his active life was spent in (boarding?) school in Newberry, Laurens and Anderson. He was an exemplary and active Christian, and derived much confort when the infirmities of old age came upon him, from the reading and meditations of the Holy Scripture.

March 23, 1871

Married on the 2(6?) th Feb. 1871, by Rev. W.F. Martin, at the residence of Effie Smith, Mr. John Davis and widow Thana Griffin, all of Anderson County.

May 25, 1871

Married at the residence of the bride's uncle, Maj. F.C.V. Borstel, on the 16th of Nov. 1870, by the Rev. W.E. Boggs, of Columbia, Mr. N.C. Joyner of Richland County and Miss Cassa B. Dorrill, of Anderson S.C.

At the same place, on the 17th of May 1871, by Rev. J.S. Murray, Mr. Samuel Cunningham and Miss Caro H. Dorrill, both of Anderson S.C.

Married in Townville, on Saturday the 13th of May, 1871, by Rev. H.N. Hays, Mr. W.F. Jeans and Miss Mary S. Palmer, all of Anderson County.

On Sunday, May 14th 1871, by Rev. H.N. Hays, Mr. James Barton and Miss Martha Simmons, all of Anderson County.

Aug. 24, 1871

Married on the 9th of July, by Rev. W.P. Martin, Mr. Baylis Kelly and Miss Elizabeth Kelly, all of Anderson County.

Nov. 23, 1871

Married at the Baptist Church, on Sunday evening, Nov. 19, 1871 by Rev. J. Scott Murray, Mr. Wm. Baker of Charleston, and Miss Cora D. Wilhite, youngest daughter of Dr. P.A. Wilhite. Dec. 7, 1871

Married on Thursday Evening, November 30, 1871, at the residence of the bride's father, by Rev. W.A. Hodges, Mr. James Wakefield, of Abbeville County and Miss Elvira S. Clinkscales, of Anderson County.

Died at Greenville C.H., on the 21st Miss Julia Werner, late of

Pendleton, S.C. in the 29th year of her age.



OBITUARIES OF CONFEDERATE VETERANS

The following obituaries were taken from The Confederate Veteran. The Veteran was "published monthly in the interest of Confederate veterans and kindred topics", and ran from 1893 until 1932.

Vol. XIX No. 8, August 1911, Pp. 391 and 395

G.F. Amos, a veteran of the Mexican and Civil Wars, one of the oldest men of Etowah County, Ala., died at his home, in Short Creek, on July 3, aged ninety-two years. He was born in Spartanburg, S.C. in 1819, and lived in that State until 1844, when he migrated to Georgia, and there married Miss Emeline Satterfield in 1845. To them were born nine children, seven of whom are still living. He enlisted in the war against Mexico in 1846, and served to its close, when he returned to his home in Georgia. In 1859 he removed to DeKalb County, Ala.; and when the Civil War began, he enlised under Capt. W. B. Beeson, and served through the great conflict as a private, doing his duty valiantly until mustered out in Memphis in 1865.

In many ways the coming generations can afford to emulate the life of "Uncle Frank", as he was familiarly called. He was fearless and courageous and daring in the expression of his opinions, yet according to others the same freedom. He was a close student of events transpiring in his day, and retained his interest in public matters even to the last.

Capt. W.B. Beeson, under whom he served as a member of Company G, 49th Alabama, writes from Collinsville, Ala.; "In the early days of the Civil War George F. Amos was mustered into service at Nashville, Tenn., and was one of the finest looking soldiers I ever saw. He was six feet two inches in height, weighted two hundred pounds, and was as straight as an Indian, and every fiber of that great body was made up of gallantry and courage."

James B.F. Burns was born in Laurens District, S.C. February 25, 1825; and died near Hattiesburg, Miss., August 25, 1910. He was buried at Decatur, Miss. In 1848 he was married to Miss Emily Brown. He served in Company H of the 1st Regiment, commanded by General Forrest.

Vol. XX No. 1, January 1912, Pp. 34 and 37.

On the 9th of October, 1911, occurred the death of Capt. Thomas M. Saunders of Chester County, S.C., in his sixty-eighth year. He had lived all his life near the town of Chester. He lost his father when a child and was reared by a devoted grandfather. When quite a young he was sent to the military school at York, from which he ran away to join the army when not quite seventeen years old. He became a member of Company D, lst South Carolina Regiment, under Capt. W. Alex Walker. He was detailed from his company as courier on Gen. J.E.B. Stuart's staff, where he served, as he said, until he wore out three horses carrying dispatches.

In the redemption of his State from misrule in 1876 Captain Saunders did heroic service, commanding a company in that stirring period. He was ever ready to do anything for his country's good of the betterment of his fellow men. He was a Christian of simple, ardent, and direct character.

After the war Captain Saunders was married to Miss Ada Elizabeth Walker, youngest daughter of Adam Terry Walker and Elizabeth Newport Head Walker, and to them were born seven children-four sons and three daughters. He was of Scotch-Irish descent, and also a lineal descendant of Sir Peter Osborne, of Kent, England.

The death of Robert L. Keys occured in October at the home of Mr. Samuel Powers, of Anderson, S.C. He was the fourth brother to die in eighteen months. He is survived by two brothers and a sister. For thirty years or more he was agent at Anderson for the Southern Express Company and in later years had been a successful farmer.

Robert Keys enlised in the Confederate service as a member of the Palmetto Riflemen, Company C, of Anderson, with which we served throughout the war. He was made color sergeant for the Palmetto Riflemen with the 4th Regiment, of which his original company had been a part. He served with distinction and was twice wounded. At the close of the war he returned to Anderson, and in 1868 was married to Miss Annie C. Archer, who died some eleven years ago.

Death came suddenly to Zack Howell at his home, in Shreveport, La., after a brief illness of acute digestion. He was born in Chester County, S.C., and was in his seventy seventh year. Erect, agile, and of a cheerful disposition, he viewed life from its brightest side.

In 1856 he went to Shreveport, where he engaged successfully in business as a cotton factor and a warehouseman, and he was also interested in agricultural matters. He was a splendid citizen as he had been a good soldier-a defender of the Confederacy, serving in Company A, 25th Louisana Infantry. He was in the battles of Perryville, Ky., Murfreesboro, Tenn., and several engagements under Gen. J.E. Johnson. At the close of the war he surrendered at Shreveport, having been transfered from the Army of Tennessee.

Comrade Howell is survived by two daughters and two sons. He was a member of Leroy Stafford Camp, U.V.C., from which a delegation attended the funeral.

BOOK REVIEWS

Our Heritage Columbia County [Georgia] 1754-1983 by Janette S. Kelley. Order from Mrs. Janette S. Kelley, Star Route Box 66A-2, Harlem, GA 30814. Soft cover, 144 pages, indexed, \$7.95.

This is the first of a series of volumes planned to preserve the heritage of Columbia County, Georgia, which is located northwest of Augusta. The subtitle of this volume is "Personalities 1754-1983". However, it is not limited to individual persons. It includes sketches on families including those found in Dr. R. H. Casey's Reminiscences (which have been reprinted in full) that were published in 1883 in the Columbia Sentenial. (It might be well to mention here that Dr. Casey's articles also includes families from McDuffie County, Georgia.

Also included in this volume is a reprint of the Columbia County section from Memoirs of Georgia published in 1890 by the Southern Historical Society; reflections of senior citizens; a list of Columbia County soldiers killed in the Civil War, World War I and World War II; interviews with public officials; and land grants in St. Paul's parish, which included this area of Georgia during the colonial period.

Among the featured surnames included in this volume are Bailey, Baldwin, Beasley, Boyd, Bullard, Calhoun, Candler, Carr, Casey, Clary, Crawford, Davis, Dent, Evans, Few, Gibson, Hardin, Hardy, Harrison, Hayne, Hunt, Jones, Johns, Lee, Magruder, Means, Marshall, McDaniel, Morris, Morrow, Nash, Phillips, Pollard, Prather, Reid, Richards, Rogers, Smith, Watson, Williams, and Young.

This book is a real must for people with roots in this area and I would highly recommend it. The introduction states that this book is the result of ten years of research. It is well done.

Wallace A. Rainey and Jessie I. Ringer Their Ancestors, Descendants and Allied Families by Ralph E. Rainey. Order this volume from Ralph E. Rainey, Box 296, Carlyle, IL 62231. Hadrover, 402 pages, indexed, \$35.00.

Ralph E. Rainey has traced his parent's ancestory from Illinois through Kansas and Pennsylvania to Germany. One can tell that much research has gone into this genealogy and the author has made great efforts to cite his sources in such a manner that other researchers can check his findings with ease.
