

Unlike other cemetery books, this one is crafted to meet the genealogist's needs by paying special attention to the plot and row arrangement of the graves. It presents transcripts of 58 Spartanburg County cemeteries in their entirety. Among the churches presented are Philadelphia Baptist, Bethesda Baptist, Concord Methodist, Mount Carmel Methodist, New Hope Methodist, and North Pacolet Presbyterian. In all, 21 churches, including 7 extinct ones, are published. Also, 34 family cemeteries, and 3 community and private cemeteries appear here.

Marriages From THE CAROLINA SPARTAN Newspapers 1866-1869, compiled and edited by Faye Berry Emcry 27 pages, indexed. Soft cover \$6.50

This is a complete listing of 1866-1869 marriages found in THE CAROLINA SPARTAN, a Spartanburg, South Carolina newspaper. Although these marriages are found in Spartanburg newspapers, they are not confined to that area. Many pertain to persons living in other counties of South Carolina and a few concern persons living in other states.

The Descendents of James Crook and Related Families 1746-1978. Compiled and edited by Martha King Neubauer 463 pages, including 63 page index. \$42.00

The society has acquired the 28 remaining copies of this detailed study of the James Crook family of Virginia and later Spartanburg County, S.C. However, the late Mrs. Neubauer did not limit this work to this particular family. She included information on other branches of the Crook family in England and America. She also included pictures of tombstones and various Crook homes. The second part includes information on the following related families: Anthony, Bane, Barry, Brockman, Burk, Coleman, Evins, King, Mann, Newman, Patton, Stallworth, Travis, and White families. "Bits and Pieces" (Part III) is an abstract from records of persons of the same surname, but with whom no proof of relationship has been established.

SOME NOTES ON THE JAMES LYLES FAMILY OF NEWBERRY

The following information was found in Richardson's Law Reports, Volume I. Law books are often overlooked as a source of information for the genealogist.

James M. Henderson vs. Joseph D. Kenner Before Judge O'Neal at Newberry, July, Extra Term, 1844

This was an action of trespass to try title to a tract of land represented on the plat used at the trial, by the letters F and C. The land was first owned by James Lyles, who died intestate during the Revolution. He left a widow named Lucy, (who afterwards married one Goree) and three daughters, Ruth, Elizabeth (who married Benjamin Maybin) and Nancy. In 1810, dower was assigned to the widow, and partition had by consent. The part marked C, with twice as much more, was assigned as dower, and the part marked F, was alloted to Ruth. In 1816, Ruth died, leaving an illegitimate daughter, Dolly Lyles, to whom she devised her whole estate. J.L. Goree was named executor in the will, and he was one of the subscribing witnesses. Lucy, the mother, Elizabeth and Nancy, survived Ruth. In 1831, Lucy Goree died, leaving Elizabeth and Nancy surviving her, and a daughter by her second marriage, Mrs. Kenner, the wife of Samuel E. Kenner, and mother of the defendant. On part of the land allotted to Ruth, was a field, which was cultivated by the guardian of Dolly Lyles, until 1819, and after that time, rented out by him for five years, for the benefit of Dolly. In 1829, Dolly removed to the west and appointed Davis Caldwell her agent. In the same year, Benjamin Maybin built a house on Dolly's land, (the tract marked F,) and stuck up a notice in the neighborhood, that he claimed the land in right of his wife, but if Dolly ever returned, he would abandon the possession. In 1831, Dolly brought an action of trespass to try title against Benjamin Maybin, and in 1835, at Fall Term, the case was tried, and a verdict was rendered for the defendant. In 1834 or 5, the house built by Benjamin Maybin, was, with his permission, removed from the land. No one remaining in possession, in 1837, and before two years from the time the verdict was rendered had expired, Davis Caldwell, as agent of Dolly Lyles, took possession of the land, built a house on it, and rented it out for three years. In 1840, the defendant, as agent of his father, Samuel E. Kenner, bought the crop from the tenant of Dolly, and took possession of the land. In 1841, Dolly sold the land to Samuel E. Kenner, and the defendant remained in possession, as tenant of his father. In the same year, Benjamin Maybin and wife conveyed all their interest in the land to the plaintiff. On behalf of the defendant, Davis Caldwell testified that the action of Dolly Lyles, against Benjamin Maybin, was defeated, on the ground that no trespass was proved. This testimony was objected to, but admitted by the court. As to the part marked C, there was some evidence which went to show an actual "ouster". Thejury found for the defendant, and the plantiff later appealed.

Pp. 99-100 18 June 1793; Robert Chapman of Union County to Wm. Gaston, for £3 and 15 shillings, 200 acres on Wilson's Branch and bounded by lands belonging to the Estate of Alexander Tomb decd, and Vacant land originally granted to Wm Chapman brother to the Robert Chapman and now decd the 26 June 1787. Wit. Jos. Brown, James Love Gaston, John Brown.

Pp. 100-102 26 November 1792; Francis Greenwood and Elizabeth his wife to Robert Walker for £5 sterling, 100 acres on Branches of Sandy River originally granted to Ephraim Mitchell Esq on 15 October 1784 and conveyed by him to David Hopkins and by him to Francis Greenwood on March 29, 1785; bounded by lands of Henry Hardin, David Hudson and land claimed by Stephen Terry. Wit. John Pratt, Lydia Pratt, Jennet Pratt.

Pp. 102-104 1 November 1792; David Hopkins and Mary his wife to Frances Greenwood for £100 sterling, 100 acres on Branches of Sandy River originally granted to Ephraim Mitchell Esq on 15 Oct 1784 and conveyed by him to David Hopkins on 29 March 1785; bounded by Henry Hardin and David Hudson's land. Wit. Samuel Harris, Ferd. Hopkins.

Pp. 104-105 26 May 1793; James Gaston to Benjamin Morris, one negro boy named Jeremiah for the sum of £32 sterling. Wit. Mark Eaven, Samuel McCreary, John McCreary.

Pp. 105-107 1 March 1793; Nathaniel Pace of Kershaw County, Camden District to John Morris of Pinckney District, Chester County for 10 shillings, 55 acres situated in the then District of Camden but now Pinckney District on a Ridge of Rock Creek on the NW side of the Catawba River, bounded by Thomas Morris, Middleton's land and John Cooper's land. Wit. Elijah Banckston, Thomas Britton.

Pp. 108-110 May 1793; John Walker and Agnes his wife to John Walker son of Samuel Walker for £60 sterling, 140 acres on the Waters of Sandy River granted on 2 October 1786 to John Walker, bounded by Jonathan Dungan. Wit. Hugh Stuart, James Norton.

Pp. 110-111 1 March 1784; James Burns planter of Camden District to Laird Burns, planter, for £6 sterling money of South Carolina, all Titles, Rights, and Claims into the Estate of Laird Burns of Pinckney District late deceased. Wit. Robert Boyd, Hugh Weir.

Pp. 112-114 26 June 1793; William Boyd and Ann his wife to James Sloan for £26 and 10 shillings, 100 acres on Bullskin Run, then Craven County, bounded by lands of Micajah Pickett, originally granted on 14 September 1771 to William Houston and conveyed by William Houston and Elinor his wife to William Boyd. Wit. John McDonald, James Nyle.

Pp. 115-119 22 June 1793; James Bankhead to Thomas McDill for £30 sterling, 150 acres on a small branch of Rockey Creek, bounded by James Bankhead, Patrick Harbison, John McDill, and Edward Lowances, originally part of a tract granted on 16 June 1768 to Samuel Frazor, bounded at the time of running past Mary Bayley's land and all other sides vacant land, conveyed by lease and release by said Samuel Frazor and Elizabeth his wife on 15 December 1768 to Richard Barkley who then conveyed the same by lease and release on 24 February 1774 to Joseph Wilson who did convey the same by lease and release on 12th & 13th day of April 1775 to Alexander Rogers Doctor of the sick whose (death?) it is (illigible) unto John Gray and Rebeccah as heirs of the said Alexander Rogers who did convey by lease and release on 3rd & 4th days of January 1788 the said tract of land to James Bankhead. Wit. John McDill, Patrict (Malla?), Samuel McDill.

Pp. 119-120 26 June 1793; Josiah Hill to Thomas Wallace for £90 sterling, 339 acres on Waters of Rocky Creek originally granted to Josiah Hill in 1786. Wit. John Pratt, Dr. Sims.

Pp. 120-124 14 January 1788; John Gray and Rebecca his wife of Fairfield County to James Bankhead of Chester County, planter, for £73 sterling, 150 acres on a Branch of Rocky Creek originally granted on 16 June 1768 to Samuel Frazor bounded at the time of surveying NE by Mary Bailey's land and all other sides by vacant land and conveyed by Samuel Frazor and Elizabeth his wife by lease and release on 14th & 15th December 1768 to Richard Barkley who conveyed the same by lease and release on 23rd & 25th February 1774 to Joseph Milligan who conveyed the same on 12th & 13th April 1775 by lease and release to Alexander Rogers Doctor by whose death it has devolved unto the said John Gray and Rebecca his wife as Executors and heirs of the said Alexander Rogers. Wit. Danl. Cochran, James Hanna.

Pp. 124-126 4 January 1793; Samuel Atkins to Henry Jordan for £10, 225 acres on the Catawba River, originally granted to Culp and conveyed by him to James Patton decd and by Sheriff's Titles to Samuel Atkins, bounded by Rebecca Patton, and land belonging to the said Samuel and Richard Atkins. Wit. Thomas Baird, Thomas Wood, J. McCreary.

HOPEWELL METHODIST CHURCH ORGANIZED IN 1830

The following history of Hopewell Methodist church was written by J.E. King and appeared in the July 8, 1965 issue of The News, a daily newspaper published in Westminister, SC.

The first church organized where Hopewell Methodist church now stands was known as the Liles church. This was probably due to the fact that Joseph Liles was the main leader in this organization. The services were held in private residences on weekdays or at night until a building could be erected.

In or around the year 1830, a building was erected of hewn logs with a stick and clay chimney. The building was used for both church and school and for sometime was located where the Hopewell cemetery is now. At that time it was in the North Carolina conference.

In the year 1855 a frame building was built primarity (sic) by Joseph Liles and Thomas Jenkins. It continued to go by the name of the Liles church until 1857 when the Rev. Fletcher Smith, the preacher in charge, gave it the name "Hopewell." The second building was in use until 1879 when it was destroyed by fire.

In the year 1857 when the second building was in use, we find the following list of members taken from an old class book dating from June 19, 1857 to March 16, 1867. The first list contains these names:

By the year 1862 there appears to be quite a number of new members. Notatins (sic) following many names indicate that they were either in the army or had died in the service.

Listed below are some of the names of those who were in the army:

By the fall of 1865 we find the membership organized in classes "A", "B", "C", "D", and "E." Then in March of 1866 we find a record of a Sunday school having been organized. W.A. McWhorter was the first superintendent with J.L. Harbert serving as superintendent later on.

The church school record would not be complete without giving due honor and credit to J.L. Bryan, who for a continuous period of 40 years served as superintendent of the church school. His granddaughter and her family, including her children and grandchildren unto the third and fourth generation, continue to be very active members of the church and church school.

Then there were the children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of Andrew Miller Pickens who have been loyal supporters of the church and church school down through the years. There are, also, the descendants of Elbert and Emily Jenkins Davis, who through the years and up to the present time, have given the work of the church wonderful support.

In this class book or journal of Hopewell Methodist church conferences we find some very interesting items pertaining to some of their meetings and financial statements. For instance, under the date of Thursday, May 17, 1866, we find the following question and answer:

Question: What report from the church treasurer? Answer: Church treasurer reports as follows:

Balance on hand at last conference	\$11.00

In another place we find a record of a meeting dated Jan. 20, 1866:

"Public worship was conducted at night by Rev. J.H.C. McKinney, preaching from Jerr. 22 c: 29 v. Also Jan. 21 lovefeast 9:30 o'clock a.m. Preaching at 11 o'clock from John 3rd c: 9 v, after which the Lord's supper was administered by preacher in charge. Preaching in afternoon by Rey. Drury Knox from 1st Tim., 1st c: 15 v. Feb. 1 preaching by Rev. R.M. Harrison, J.P. 1st Tim., 2 c: 1 v."

Another meeting was dated only as the first Sunday in March, 1866.

"Lovefeast 9:30 a.m. Preaching at 11 a.m. from Acts 11 c : 23 v. Preaching at 3 p.m. from John 19 c: 25 v. to the colored

did not give up. Thomas Jenkins deeded the church 25 acres of land for a church lot and 6/10 of an acre for a cemetery. Jenkins also gave the material for another building. R.A.

When the second building was destroyed by fire, the people

Gilmer was the architect and chief supervisor of construction. R.H. Waters and Hamp Crosby were the head carpenters. Both Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins and Gilmer are buried in the Hopewell cemetery.

In those days there was an abundance of virgin timber and the best was used in erecting this building. It is said that the sills were 24 inches square and were hewn from choice heart logs the full length of the building which was 80 feet by 90 feet and would comfortably accommodate 500 people.

Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins raised 5 sons and 6 daughters, all of whom are buried at Hopewell with the exception of their oldest son, Wm. H.H. Jenkins. He served through the Civil War and died June 28, 1865 at Charleston, S.C., after having been released from prison at Point Lookout, Md., on June 6, 1865. He died of malnutrition before reaching home after the war and was buried in Magnolia cemetery at Charleston.

This third building was in use until March 18, 1939. Around 11:30 one mourning funeral services were being conducted for Lawrence McGuffin when someone discovered a fire on the roof. The fire started on the east side and since there was a strong wind blowing from the west the fire was burning slowly.

The large crowd attending the funeral could have easily extinguished the fire if there had been any fire fighting equipment available. There was no water-not even a well. The roof was high and no ladder available with sufficent height to reach it.

Those attending the funeral service hastily carried out all the furnishings, including the window sash. The pews and window are now in use in a very comfortable but smaller building which was erected and dedicated in less than a year. Bishop Clare Purcell dedicated this building. Rev. L.D. Gillespie was district superintendent and Rev. G.T. Hughes was pastor. Rev. D.A. Clyburn, Sr., preached the sermon.

In cooperation with the Jenkins-Pickens reunion the church has erected a beautiful white marble picnic table in the church yard. This table measures 3 feet by 42 feet and has 84 feet of marble seats.

At present Hopewell is very active with a membership of approximately 55. It is located about 6 miles west of Westminister and one mile north of highway 123. It is in the Westminister charge with Rev. David T. Templeton preacher in charge. He is assisted by Rev. Winston R. Morgan. BOOK REVIEWS

Ancestors and Descendants of Smiths compiled by Linda G. Cheek, Rt. 8 Box 48, Basley, SC 29640. Hard bound, 308 pages, including two indicies. \$35.00, including postage and handling.

Rather than publish a genealogy of one line of the all too common surname of Smith, Mrs. Cheek has published a compendium of of Smith materials gathered in over twenty years of research and primarily related to Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and the westward expansion of Smith families from this region. To further widen the coverage of this volume, the compiler has included lineages submitted to her by other Smith researchers (and their addresses as of 1986). Also included are undocumented and conjectural lineages as clues for future researchers.

Thoroughout this volume sources, when known, are cited and cover everything from original courthouse records to such standards as the Leonardo Andrea collection and the William and Mary Quarterly. An added bonus to this wealth of information are the two indicies. The first covers all the Smiths in the volume and the second all other surnames. This book is a must for any one interested in the Smiths in the southeastern United States.

Notes & Quotes from the Lives and Times of the Spencer Chambers
Clan by Laverne Keeler Kilgore, 6144 Whitman Ave., Ft. Worth, TX
76133. Spiral bound, 165 pages, illustrated.

Although many genealogies contain basic facts about our ancestors, Mrs. Kilgore attempts to do more. She relates many anecdotes, stories, letters, etc. which make the life of the Spencer Chambers family more real. (Also included is relevant information on Spencer's father and grandfather Barak and Phillip Chambers who lived in the Piedmont of South Carolina. The latter was born in England ca. 1750.)

Documentation is excellent. Photocopies of church records, deeds, letters, marriage licenses, etc. (in addition to nearly 50 photographs) and complete transcripts of other relevant items are provided. Anecdotes and stories are footnoted where possible.

This volume is a real boon to not only those related to the Chambers family but to those who want a clearer picture of life in the deep South late in the last century and early in the present one.

W. R. Tanner was a Confederate veteran who lived at Cowpens, Spartanburg County, SC. J. R. Gainey has acquired from his family all the remaining copies of his reminiscences, which were published in 1931. They tell the story of how one participant viewed the Civil War and relates some anecdotes of his comrades. Also included is a roster of Company C, 13th South Carolina Regiment. A must for any Civil War buff.

The 1820 Census, Chester District, South Carolina, compiled by Faye Berry. 31 pages, soft cover.

Fave Berry has abstracted the information found in the 1820 federal census for the over 1,500 families then living in Chester District. (Included in this volume are 14 families headed by "free persons of colour.") This volume eliminates the need of sitting in front of a microfilm viewer to find your ancestor's family here in 1820. It is a great research aid presented in a easy to use size and format.

The History of Mount Zion Church and Her People, by Dr. J. B. O. Landrum, edited by Joseph R. Gainey. 17 pages plus index, soft cover. \$5.00

This is a republication of a 1885 volume on Mount Zion Baptist Church, near Inman, Spartanburg County, SC. It traces the church from its establishment as a mission of Bethlebern Baptist in 1804, through it organization in 1827, up to the history's publication in 1884. This volume, though small in size, contains a wealth of information, both historical and genealogical, on Mount Zion and its early members.

1860 Mortality Census of Upper South Carolina, Volume I, compiled and edited by Faye Berry. 33 pages, soft cover. \$6.50

This is first in a two volume set which will include all of the Piedmont. Chester, Greenville, Spartanburg, Union, York, and Pickens Districts are in this volume. (Pickens at the time incorporated what is now Oconee County. Cherokee County was then found as part of Spartanburg, Union, and York counties.) Ms. Berry has listed all persons legible on the microfilm copy at the S. C. state archieves. She has given their name, sex, age, race, and month of death as reported by the enumerator.

An Account of Marriages Solemnized By Tolaver Robertson In South Carolina Between October 1842 & February 1867, edited by Joseph R. Gainey. 16 pages plus index. \$5.00

Rev. Tolaver Robertson kept an account of the marriages he "solemnized". This is not an unusual practice. What is unusual is that he published it in 1867. However, only one copy is known to have survived. This is a republication of the material found in it. Since marriage records were not kept by the State of South Carolina before 1911, this is a great boon to genealogists, especially those with roots in Laurens and Greenville counties. Robertson recorded 364 marriages for nearly 275 different surnames.
