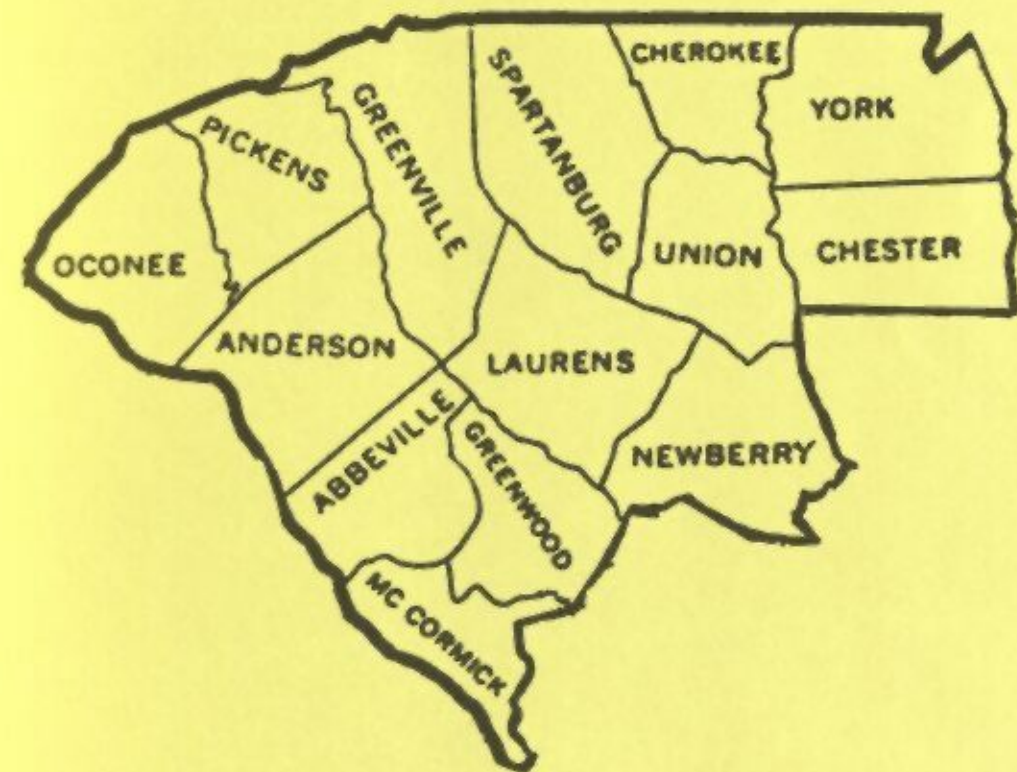

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CLERICAL ACTS OF REV. JOHN D. MCCOLLOUGH

Unfortunately, records kept by clergymen in the Piedmont from the last century (or even early this century) are a rare find for genealogists. One of the most geographically comprehensive records for the Piedmont is that kept by Dr. John DeWitt McCollough an Episcopal priest who founded most of the Episcopal churches in the upstate that were established prior to 1900.

Rev. McCollough was born December 8, 1822 at Society Hill, Darlington County, S. C. He came to the upstate when he was elected principal of the Glenn Spring Academy in January 1848. That same year he was ordained a deacon. On July 28, 1850, he was ordained a priest. He spent the rest of his life (with the exception of his service as a Confederate chaplain) in the upstate. His death occurred in Walhalla, Oconee County, S. C. on January 23, 1902. At that time, he was pastor of a mission congregation there. He is buried at the Church of the Advent, Spartanburg, S. C. which he founded.

The records presented here are from a small manuscript volume at the South Caroliniana Library at the University of South Carolina, Columbia, S. C. entitled "Record of Clerical acts by Jno. D. McCollough of South Carolina, who was made a Deacon in the Church of God in Trinity Church, Columbia by the Rt. Rev. C. E. Gadsden on the 21st day of June A.D. 1848. Presented for orders by the Rev. P. J. Shands[.]" This volume is 122 pages in length and covers the years 1848 through 1865 inclusive. If he kept records for subsequent years, their whereabouts are unknown. In addition to the records of a genealogical nature presented in this and future issues, he kept a detailed record of all services he conducted which is only of use to a biographer. There are four basic types of records presented here:

1. Baptisms. In general these were performed before a congregation. However, in emergencies they could be performed in private. In such a situation, it had to be acknowledged before the local congregation. McCollough included both baptisms and receptions in his record.
2. Confirmations. Confirmation in the Episcopal Church is performed only by a bishop. This ceremony endows the recipient with the Holy Spirit and makes them full members of the church. McCollough lists those whom he presented to the bishop for confirmation and the location.
3. Marriages. It is interesting that on several occasions he violated South Carolina law and married slave couples.
4. Burials. The Episcopal rite for the burial of the dead is reserved to baptized Christians "who have not laid violent hands upon themselves." However, a priest may, when necessary, conduct a funeral for anyone with a reduction of ceremonies. This is an "informal" burial. Dr. McCollough recorded two such funerals.

ABSTRACT OF REV. WAR PENSION APPLICATION OF GEORGE WATTS

The information following was found in the papers on file in the Pension Claim W 1009, based upon the service of George Watts in the Revolutionary War.

He was born January 11, 1762 in Hanover County, Virginia; the names of his parents was not stated. At the time of the Rev. War he resided in Ninety-Six District (later Laurens District, SC).

George Watts enlisted September 1779; served as private and sergeant in Capt. Wm. Davis' company, Col Williams' SC Regiment. He was at the siege of Savannah and in the battle there Oct. 9th, and was discharged at Augusta, having served three months. He enlisted May 1781 and served six months as private in Capt. Simmons' SC company, during which he was in the siege of Ninety-Six, under Col. Washington. He volunteered about Nov. 20, 1781 and served one year as private in Capt. Samuel Moore's SC company which was commanded later by Lieut Joseph Reed, during which he was in a severe engagement with the Tory leader, Cunningham, and escaped by swimming the Saluda River. He enlisted Dec. 1782, and served three months as private in Capt. Robert Maxwell's company in Gen. Pickens' campaign against the Indians, during which he burned Indian towns, assisted in killing their warriors and in taking their squaws and children prisoners. He resided in Laurens District, SC from which he moved to Jackson County, Tennessee. George Watts was allowed pension on his application executed Dec. 6, 1832 at which time he resided in Jackson County, Tennessee. He had resided in that county for more than 20 years. He died Jan. 4, 1835. George Watts married April 21, 1789, Mary B. Walker. They were married at her father's house in Laurens District, SC but the names of her parents were not given. Mary B. Watts, widow, was allowed pension on her application executed Oct. 10, 1838, at which time she was age 71. She resided then in Jackson Co., TN. She was living there in 1849. The names of the children of George and Mary Watts are shown as follows: Sally Watts, b. March 1, 1790; Martha T. Watts, b. April 22, 1792; James Watts, b. Jan. 31, 1794; Mansfield Watts, b. Dec. 19, 1795; Nancy W. Watts, b. Aug. 9, 1797; Lucinda Watts, b. April 28, 1799; Susannah Watts, b. Nov. 9, 1801; Ann T. Watts, b. Feb. 23, 1804; Fanney Watts, b. Jan. 4, 1806. The following was recorded also: Eliza Watts, a grandchild of G. adn Polley Watts, b. Dec. 21, 1812. In 1832, James Watts, a brother of George Watts, resided in Laurens District, SC. In 1838, Sally N. Osborn, age 57, stated that she was present at the marriage of her sister Mary B. to George Watts. One Martha Walker, a resident of said Jackson County in 1838 gave her age as about 68; that she lived as a neighbor to George Watts and Mary B. as children, and was an attendant at their marriage. She did not state any relationship to the family. In 1849, Alexander McCawley and S. B. McCawley witnessed the signature of Mary B. Watts, the widow in Jackson County, Tennessee. Their relationship to the soldier was not stated.

ABSTRACT OF WAR OF 1812 PENSION APPLICATION OF JOSEPH LILES

WO 18842 WC 14298

Bounty land warrants 22083 for 160 acres in 1850

Enlisted October 8, 1812; discharged April 1813

Residence in 1851 was Pickens County, SC. In 1878, the widow was residing at Westminster, Oconee County, SC. Her maiden name was Zela Ward. She and Joseph Liles/Lyles were married near Westminster, SC in 1846. He died there July 26, 1870. She stated her husband was born April 9, 1792 and died July 26, 1870; that she had resided near the above place since 1840; that her husband enlisted in the lower part of SC and was discharged at Savannah, GA. An Affidavit of Thomas Jenkins in Oconee County, SC, age 69, states he was present at the marriage of Joseph Lyles to Miss Zila Ward in 1846 at Fort Madison SC by Edward Hughes, a Justice of the Peace. Affidavit of J. R. Ward in Clark County, GA stated that he was present at the marriage of Joseph Lyles to the claimant Zila Lyles which occurred in 1846 at Westminster, SC by Edward Hughes, a J.P. Declaration was also made by Zila Lyles in Oconee County, SC in 1878 stating Joseph Lyles volunteered at Edgefield, SC as private in the SC Infantry; that he was nearly all the time stationed at St Marys, Georgia, having first volunteered and then enlisted in another command, discharged at Savannah, GA in 1814. Declaration was made by Joseph Liles in Pickens County, SC, June 20, 1851 for a land warrant. His original discharge was filed signed Camp Jackson, Effingham County, Georgia June 6, 1814 by Wm Bee? (or Bell), 1st Lieut, 8th Inf, commanding a company.

In 1922, the pension department had correspondence with Hon. Fred H. Dominick, House of Representatives. It was a very long and interesting letter regarding an unmarked grave in Oconee County; that he had served in Florida, married in Savannah, Georgia at the close of the war, returned and came from Laurens County to Oconee County; left no children.

Leroy H. Hodges b. 1806, SC, d. 1882 Jefferson Co., AL, wed Permelia, b. 1802, SC, d. 1867 Jefferson Co., AL. I do not know her maiden name. I believe that Leroy lived in Laurens Co., SC in 1830 and Abbeville Co., SC in 1840 and by 1850 he had removed to Jefferson Co., AL where he remained until his death. I have made several trips to SC, two to the Archives in Columbia and I need help. It is tradition in our family to use our middle name, so Leroy could be listed as Henry, Harvey, Hendrick, Harris or any other name beginning with an H. He had a brother known to me only as T. H. Hodges who lived in Rosse (Limestone or Robertson Co.) Texas in 1877. Children of Leroy were: William Pressley, b. 1830; Joel Bradford, b. 1832; Daniel Franklin, b. 1835; Martha, b. 1837; Thomas Daniel, b. 1837; Mary Ann, b. 1843; Permelia Susan, b. 1871; John Alexander, b. 1872; Robert Austin, b. 1874. The last three were by a second wife and were born in Alabama. The first six were all born in SC. I would like to hear from anyone doing Hodges research in the Laurens, Abbeville, Greenwood area. On census, Leroy's father was born in NC.

William W. May, b. 1794, VA, d. Aug. 9, 1844, SC, wed Mary ? ,

b. 1801, SC, d. April 6, 1879, Jefferson Co., AL. Tradition has it that Mary was a Cherokee Indian. Known children were: Dorothea Louisa, b. 1820; William H., b. 1833; Marion A., b. 1836; Benjamin Wofford, b. 1842. All were born in SC. William May was a Methodist minister. There was a William May who asked for and received, permission to travel and then to live in the Cherokee nation. Was this my William May? The request to travel into the Cherokee nation was also for a Daniel May. Was he a brother? Listed in the old family Bible were these names, George W. May died 1839, William W. May died Aug. 9, 1844, James T. May died Dec. 25, 1847, Sarah E. May died Jan. 9, 1848. I would like to exchange information on the May families.

In the early 1850s, three Gilliam brothers appear in Floyd Co., GA. I have been unable to locate them on any 1850 census. All census records show SC as their birthplace. These brothers are: Samuel T. Gilliam, b. 16 March 1828, d. July 22, 1867, wed Mary Jane Bradley on 2 Dec. 1851; John Wesley Gilliam, b. 30 June 1829, d. 20 Oct. 1903, wed Sarah Caroline Self; Robert E. Gilliam, b. 1832, d. ca 1877, wed Roxana Bradley (sister to Mary Jane) on 8 August 1852. On the 1870 census, a Rebecca Gilliam, age 67, is shown as "at home" with the John Wesley Gilliam family. She may be their mother. I have the names of all the children of each brother. After Samuel's death, Mary Jane sold the family farm to a nephew and moved her family to Corinth, Miss, to be near two of her brothers. Robert E. Gilliam's wife, Roxanna, d. ca 1867 and he later moved on into Tennessee where he married Elizabeth Byrd. John Wesley Gilliam who was a lay preacher of the Methodist faith, remained in Floyd Co. until his death in 1903. I am anxious to locate the parents of these three brothers and their siblings, if any.

In all, 21 churches, including 7 extinct ones, are published. Also, 34 family cemeteries, and 3 community and private cemeteries appear here.

The society has acquired the 28 remaining copies of this detailed study of the James Crook family of Virginia and later Spartanburg County, S.C. However, the late Mrs. Neubauer did not limit this work to this particular family. She included information on other branches of the Crook family in England and America. She also included pictures of tombstones and various Crook homes. The second part includes information on the following related families: Anthony, Bene, Berry, Brockman, Berk, Coleman, Evans, King, Mann, Newman, Patton, Stallworth, Travis, and White families. "Bits and Pieces" (Part III) is an abstract from records of persons of the same surname, but with whom no proof of relationship has been established.

W. R. Tanner was a Confederate veteran who lived at Cowpens, Spartanburg County, SC. J. R. Gainey has acquired from his family all the remaining copies of his reminiscences, which were published in 1931. The 1820 Census, Chester District, South Carolina, compiled by Faye Berry. 31 pages, soft cover.

Faye Berry has abstracted the information found in the 1820 federal census for the over 1,500 families then living in Chester District. (Included in this volume are 14 families headed by "free persons of colour.") This volume eliminates the need of sitting in front of a microfilm viewer to find your ancestor's family here in 1820. It is a great research aid presented in a easy to use size and format.

The History of Mount Zion Church and Her People, by Dr. J. B. O. Landrum, edited by Joseph R. Gainey. 17 pages plus index, soft cover.

This is a republication of a 1885 volume on Mount Zion Baptist Church, near Inman, Spartanburg County, SC. It traces the church from its establishment as a mission of Bethlehem Baptist in 1804, through its organization in 1827, up to the history's publication in 1884. This volume, though small in size, contains a wealth of information, both historical and genealogical, on Mount Zion and its early members.

1860 Mortality Census of Upper South Carolina, Volume I, compiled and edited by Faye Berry. 33 pages, soft cover.

This is first in a two volume set which will include all of the Piedmont. Chester, Greenville, Spartanburg, Union, York, and Pickens Districts are in this volume. (Pickens at the time incorporated what is now Oconee County. Cherokee County was then found as part of Spartanburg, Union, and York counties.) Ms. Berry has listed all persons legible on the microfilm copy of the S. C. state archives. She has given their name, sex, age, race, and month of death as reported by the enumerator.

An Account of Marriages Solemnized By Tolaver Robertson In South Carolina Between October 1842 & February 1867, edited by Joseph R. Gainey. 16 pages plus index.

Rev. Tolaver Robertson kept an account of the marriages he "solemnized". This is not an unusual practice. What is unusual is that he published it in 1867. However, only one copy is known to have survived. This is a republication of the material found in it. Since marriage records were not kept by the State of South Carolina before 1911, this is a great boon to genealogists, especially those with roots in Laurens and Greenville counties. Robertson recorded 364 marriages for nearly 275 different surnames.
