


UPPER SOUTH CAROLINA GENEALOGY & HISTORY

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BASTARDY PROCESSES FOR SPARTANBURG COUNTY

Continued from Volume VI, No. 4.

State vs Sally Gill

Recognizance bond was signed on July 21, 1807 before David Morton, Justice of the Quorum, by Sally Gill, Moses Swofford and Alston Balley. Mother of the illegitimate child was Sally Gill.

State vs William West

Bond signed on September 25, 1821 before E. Bomar, C.C.G.S. by Casey West and Delilah West Casey (see Editor's note below). The bond was signed for Rebecca Casey a single woman who had given birth to a male baby on August 12, 1821 "begotten by William West".

Editor's Note: Delilah's surname was written WEST twice and then marked through and written Casey.

State vs Polley Rodgers

A bond was signed before William Hendrix on April 3, 1818 by Polley Rodgers, Edmon Rogers, and James Rodgers. A male baby had been born on September 5, 1817 to Polley Rodgers. Edmon Rodgers was named as the father.

State vs William Wofford/Judah Wright

A bond was signed before William Smith, Justice of the Quorum, on October 4, 1804 by William Wofford, John Wofford, Senior and James Wofford in the matter of Judah Wright who had given birth to a male child.

State vs Martha Smith

A bond was signed before Saml Lancaster, Justice of the Peace, on March 22, 1804, by Martha Smith, Willis Welleford and Brittain Welleford in the case of Martha Smith who had given birth to an illegitimate female

State vs Elijah Barnett/Nancy Barnett

A bond was signed on September 12, 1804 before W. Lancaster, Justice of the Quorum, by Elijah Barnett, Richard James and James Barnett. The mother of the illegitimate child was Nancy Barnett. Commissioners of the Poor that were named are: Christopher Golightly, Elisha Heady and Jacob Uttley, Esquire.

State vs Susanah Hammitt

A bond was signed before Drury McDaniels, Justice of the Peace, on September 10, 1805 by Susannah Hammitt, William Moore and Starling Hudgins. The mother, Susanah Hammett, had given birth to an illegitimate male.

State vs Theny Stubblefield/Edward Stubblefield

A bond was signed before Henry Turner, Justice of the Quorum, on July 15, 1809, by Thiney Stubblefield and Edward Stubblefield. Thiny Stubblefield was named as a single woman who had given

birth to female baby. Commissioners of the Poor were Richard Thompson, Gabriel Benson, James Vernon, William Smith and Samuel Farrow.

State vs Ann Doeg

A bond was signed before Daniel White on November 9, 1818 by Ann Doeg, Hugh Caldwell and James Doeg. Ann Doeg was named as a single woman who had given birth to an illegitimate male on October 1, 1816.

State vs Polly Garrett

The bond was signed before Henry Turner, Justice of the Quorum, on July 27, 1809 by Polly Garrett and Lawrence Bankston. Polly was a single woman and had given birth to two children, one male and one female. Commissioners of the Poor: Richard Thompson, Gabriel Benson, James Vernon, William Smith and Samuel Farrow.

State vs Laban G. Wood/Sarah Ann Coleman

Editor's Note: This file was mistakenly labled Sarah Ann Coleman when it should have been Nancy Ann Coleman.

A bond was signed before Isham Wood, Magistrate, on March 10, 1855 by L. G. Wood, Thomas Wood and John T. Smith. The mother was Nancy Ann Coleman who had given birth on July 24, 1853 to an illegitimate baby.

State vs Alexander Prewett

A bond was signed on March 25, 1826 before James Hammett, Justice of the Quorum, by Alexander Prewett, Isaac Wofford, Junr., and John Wofford. The case involved Clarendy Bettertond "now Clarendy Rampley, wife of William Rampley." Clarendy had given birth to an illegitimate male, born on October 15, 1818.

State vs Jesse Brown

On January 27, 1822, a bond was signed before William Young, Esq. by Polly Carnal (or Corral) who had given birth to an illegitimate male, born March 20, 1819. She named Jesse Brown as the father. On November 15, 1822, Jesse Brown, Charles Cox and Thomas Woodruff signed a bond before E. Bomar, J. Q.

State vs William Ross Smith

A bond was signed before A. Benson, C.C.G.S. on April 13, 1810 by William Ross Smith, Jane Smith and William Wells. The case was over Rachel Oarkeson who had given birth to an illegitimate male and named William Ross Smith as the father. Commissioners for the Poor were: William Lancaster Smith Lipscomb, Samuel Morrow, Andrew B. Moore and Abner Benson.

State vs Elisha Foster

A recognizance was signed in the case of Bastardy by Elisha Foster and another name that was illegible. Witness in the case was Jones Foster. There was nothing more in this file.

State vs Isaac Alexander

An oath was given before Randolph Turner, Magistrate, on

September 5, 1861 by Emily J. Griffin who acknowledged she had given birth to an illegitimate male, born at Pleasant Roses in Spartanburg District on August 14, 1861. She stated he has hazel eyes and brown hair and named Isaac Alexander, a farmer, as the father.

State vs Marcus Ragan

A bond was signed on October 21, 1856 before A. P. Richardson, Magistrate, by Marcus Ragan, Thomas Ragan and James Ragan. The case involved Ramath Weatherford who had given birth to an illegitimate female born on November 26, 1854 with blue eyes and light hair. The father was named as being Marcus Ragan.

State vs Nancy A. Clark

A bond was signed before D.B.P. Moorman, Magistrate, on October 17, 1849, by Nancy Ann Clark, J. N. Covington and William Camp. It was stated that Nancy Ann Clark had given birth to "a female, now about sixteen months old by the name of Selenia Eugenia."

State vs W. W. Anderson

A bond signed before George W. H. Legg, Magistrate, on March 31, 1856, by Mason G. Anderson, James Anderson and W. W. Anderson. The mother was Caroline Wright and the father was William W. Anderson. There was activity in this file from March 21, 1856 through June 30, 1866.

State vs Charles P. Bogan

On April 9, 1822, a bond was signed before E. Bomar, Justice of the Quorum, by Charles P. Bogan, Daniel Mcham and William Farrow. The mother was named as Patsy Palmer who had given birth to an illegitimate female born December 28, 1820. The father was Charles P. Bogan.

State vs Robert McClaren

A bond was signed before George Lambkin, Esquire, Justice of the Peace, on October 1, 1804, by Robert McClaren, Daniel McClaren and John McClaren. The case involved Nancy Cole who had given birth to an illegitimate child. Nothing more in this file.

State vs Abner Vise

A bond was signed before A. Benson on November 9, 1815 by Abner Vise, Aaron Moore and George Floyd. The case involved Malinda Shurley who had given birth to an illegitimate child and named Abner Vise as the father. Commissioners of the Poor: Tryre Glenn, Benjamin Bearden, James Crook, Moses Casey and Richard Thompson.

1803-1908

Inquest into the death of Nathaniel Miller...found dead on the plantation of Thomas McCarley...

Held on 2 September 1825

Jurors: James Tilman, Andrew (Bragg?), James McCarley, Fielding Tilman, Joshua Tapp, Drury McAbee, Booker Hodges, Jacob Jennings, James Yates, Thomas Hurt, WM. Calvert.

Witnesses: Wiley Burk, Thomas McCarley, Larken (Selman?), L. R. Ward, Moses Foster, Capt. Ralph Smith, Booker Hodges.

Jury ruled death was caused by drinking.

Inquest into the death of David Weatherspoon, Esq.

Held at Thomas Davis' dwelling on 5 April 1827 before F. M. Robertson.

Jurors: Robert Lipscomb, Isaac Gorden, Sterling Gorden, Robert Stacy, Richard Robertson, Charles (L?) Hester, Simpson Hester, Richard Arendle, John Williams, George Storey, John Sarratt, James Cooper, Henry Sarratt.

Jury ruled Weatherspoon caused his own death.

Inquest into the death of Giles Turner...late of Union Dist....

Taken at the home of Palmer A. Higgins on 24th and 25th of April 1827 before Joel Dean.

Jurors: James Clayton, Allen Gentry, Jeremiah Gentry, Peter M. Wallace, Fielding Clayton, John Marlow, (G?) Davis McGore, Moses Casey, Daniel Durham, Thomas Durham, Isaac Stroud, Michael Garman, Thomas Stroud, Curtis Hughes.

Witnesses: Elizabeth Word, Allen Gentry, James Clayton.

Jury ruled deceased was murdered by Palmer A. Higgins.

Inquest into the deaths of Elizabeth Low and Emeline Low

The jury was summoned on June 19, 1828

Held at the house of William Low on 20 June 1828 at 9:00 A.M. before J. W. Martin.

Jurors: James E. Henry, John L. Roland, Doct. J.J. Vernon, Doct. R. Daniel, Jabez Galt, R.C. Poole (Poole's name was marked through), Jos. McKee, Lee Linder, Esq., David W. Moore, John Poole, John Cleveland, Washington Bomar, Hiram Mitchel.

Witness: John T. Kirby

Jury ruled the deaths of the "two single women" were caused by lightning.

Inquest into the death of Adam, negro man slave of the Estate of Jane Bobo, decd.

Taken at the house of Jesse Crook on 29 Dec. 1828 by Samuel N. Evins.

Jurors: John Broughton, Joel Broughton, Warren Drummond, Starling Willis, Jarred Drummond, Jesse N. Anderson, John H. Wofford, Jesse Crook, Ely Cox, Thomas Woodruff, Jonas Broughton, Zachariah Edwards.

Witnesses: Ned, slave of J. J. Crook; Ned, slave of John

Wofford; Prune, slave of Maj. J. Crook.

Jury ruled that Adam came to his death on 27 December 1828 by a blow "from the hand of Lewis, man slave of Capt. W. W. Dickie."

Inquest into the death of Jesse Wood

Taken at the Mountain Shoals on 13 April 1829 by J. Cooper.

Jurors: Caleb Woodruff, Robert C. Hanna, James Rhodes, Robert Hanna, John Hanna, Capt. Samuel Parsons, James H. Leatherwood, William Sims, Laban Hanna, M. Drazer Cheek, Silas Woodruff, Christopher Rhodes, Joseph Casey, (illegible) Whitwire, Jeremiah Gentry, Abraham Crow.

Jury ruled deceased died by drowning in the Enoree River.

Inquest into the death of Benjamin Wood

Held at the house of Benjamin Wood on 8 May 1829 by Thos. Wood.

The jury was summoned on 7 May 1829

Jurors: Hugh Bailey, John Mayfield, Abraham Mayfield, Sen., John McDavid, John Waters, James Ford, Jesse Foster, John Duncan, Walker Morgan, Abraham Mayfield, Jr., Isham Wilsone, Isham Wood, William Hendrix, Philip C. Sexton.

Jury ruled deceased came to his death "by a visitation of God at his own house..."

Inquest into the death of David A. Dantzler

Held at Nazareth Meeting House on 29 June 1829 before Samuel N. Evins.

Jurors: Saml Pearson, John Crawford, John P. Miller, James J. Vernon, Alexr Miller, David Jordan, James Coan, James Miller, Andrew Flemming, John Coan, John Vernon (Vernon's name was marked through), Saml Nesbitt, Michael Dickson.

Jury ruled deceased came to his death by accidental drowning on 27 June 1829 in the (illegible) for Tygar River near Sloan's Old Iron Works while in the company of John Gray.

Inquest into the death of William Brice

Held on 11 July 1830 at the house of Jesse Wakefield before Saml. N. Evins.

Jurors: Thomas Woodruff, Saml Pearson, William Hoy, James W. Gaston, William Gresham, Alexr Wakefield, Sr., Alexr Wakefield, Jr., Henry Cox, George Durham, Amos Ray, William Waddel, Robert Christopher.

Jury ruled deceased was "killed by lightning in the dusk of the evening of the 10th day of said month as he was returning from muster in the yard or about a distance of 25 steps from the dwelling of Jesse Wakefield..."

Inquest into the death of Simeon, negro man slave of Dr. A. B. Moore.

Taken at the home of Mrs. Mary Moore on 24 Dec. 1830 by Saml Evins.

Jurors: Richard Barry, George Tucker, Francis Ward, Watters J. Drummond, Howel Johnson, Samuel Miller, B. S., Jno. P. Miller, Josiah Miller, James Barnett, Holman Lanhorn, H. W. Barry, Andrew Coan.

Jury ruled deceased "accidentally burned to death on 23 December 1830 in one of the Negro Houses of Mrs. Mary Moore..."

Inquest into the death of Isaac, slave of James Brockman
Held at James Brockman's Mill before Thomas Wood on 5 Feb. 1830.
Jurors: Henry Brockman, William Payne, Bozewell (Ines?), William Mahaffey, Penel Wood, Abraham Wood, William (McCalvister?), John Wood, John Glenn, Barnet Wood, Madison Greer, Thomas Greer.
Jury ruled Isaac died "with a fit in the cotton gin of James Brockman sometime in the night of the 5th day of February 1830."

Inquest into the death of Caleb Woodruff
Held at Bethel Meeting House on 5 February 1831 before S.N. Evins
Jurors: Z. Edwards, Nathaniel Wofford, John Wofford, John Wood, William Clayton, Jonathan Philips, Amos Woodruff, Lecel Brewton, Jeremiah Wofford, Philip Pilgrim, Isaac Woodruff, Philip Brewton.
Jury ruled that the deceased "died on the night of the 3rd of this instant on the road between his house and the house of Thomas Farrow, by a fall from his horse..."

Inquest into the death of John L. Stafford
Held at Timmons' old Field on 16 December 1831 before Saml N. Evins.
Jurors: Isaac Snoddy Sen., John Bomar, Richard Powel, Patrick Caldwell, Michael McElrath, Andrew Matthews, John G. Vernon, John Foster, Anthony Pearson, David Jordon, John Snoddy Jur., John Timmons.
Jury ruled death was by accidental drowning while in a state of intoxication.

Inquest into the death of John Lowe
Held on 24 June 1832 before Jno Martin. (place not given)
Jurors: Henry Turner, Hugh Green, Solomon Abbott, Edwards Turner, Middleton Turner, John Horton, Fielden Turner, John Turner, Balas Burch, Henry Abbott, William (Gowan?), Richard Potter.
Jury ruled that "cause of death was occasioned by spirituous liquors..."

Inquest into the death of Jerry, Negro man slave of Andrew Coan.
Held at the court house in the jail on 15 July 1832 before Saml N. Evins.
Jurors: Thomas Poole, James Hunt, R. M. Young, George Jones, Jesse Cleveland, Jas. E. Hewey, Wm. B. Archer, Joseph Michal, Wm. Trimmier, Alex Vernon, Jos. J. Vernon, G. B. Brewn.
Witness: John Poole, Sheriff
Jury ruled deceased "hung himself with a handkerchief from the bars in the window of the jail..."

Inquest into the death of Jacob Briges
Taken at home of deceased on 18 September 1832 before Saml. Evins
Jurors: Manly Ford, John McDowell, John Wingo, David Dantzler, Andrew F. Nesbitt, John Smith, Jeremiah Glenn, N. (Rawl?), Wm. Cornwell, John S. Coan, Robert Bailey, George Peebles.

Witnesses: Mr. Griffin, John Sanders.
Jury ruled deceased "died by a visitation from God...while in a act of burning some fodder, fell down on his head and died in that position..."

Inquest into the death of Edom, slave of William Clark
Taken at Turner's Old Field on 7 November 1832 by Joseph Campbell
Jurors: (Dr.?) Robert M. Young, Dr. Jmes J. Vernon, Thomas Thomson, Amos Austell, James Cooper, Michael Gaffney, Robert Lipscomb, Wm. G. Clarke, Wm. Mills, Esq., Richard Arendle, P. Quin Camp.
Witnesses: John Bias, Henry Burgis, Wm. Wyatt, (Hewit?) Brookes, John Wilson.
Jury ruled that "on the 29th of October last near Cooper's Furnace, the said Edom did come to his death by the violence of Gabriel Cannon striking him on the head with the butt of a wagon whip which the said Gabriel Cannon did by misfortune and contrary to his will inflict the said violence by which said Edom came to his death..." Edom died on 31 October. He had been seen drunk on Sunday night before the incident and on Monday night afterwards.
A warrant was sworn out for Gabriel Cannon by J. Campbell, Justice, on the 18th of November 1832. A bond of \$1,000.00 was put up by Gabriel Cannon, Charles Petty and James Petty on 10 November 1832.

Inquest into the death of Elisha Hembry
Taken at the house of William Hembry on 11 October 1832 before Thomas Grogan.
Jurors: William Kelso, Hugh Henderson, James A. Page, William Booker, John Delbeck, Jacob Delbeck, John Grogan, John N. Rudasil, John W. Hunt, Thomas Prince, John Ridings, John Grogan Jun., Thomas (Burchpute?), Robert D. Tally.
Jury ruled that deceased was "...found on the 10th lying in the woods on his farm about one mile from place of inquisition and is believed to have died by an act of God..."

Inquest into the death of Saul, a slave of William Clark
Taken at Cooper's Furnace on 9 January 1833 before Joseph Campbell.
Jurors: Joseph Byars, William B. Turner, John McLean, John Byars, Joshua Robertson, Thompson Robbs, Wm. Griffith, Daniel Byars, Joel McVay, Enock England, Henry F. Vitch, Charles Amos.
Jury ruled death was caused by a fall.

Inquest into the death of Samuel Staggs
Held on 18 Feb. 1833 before Reason Hellourn. (place not given)
Jurors: John Montgomery, Alexr Miller, John J. Reynolds, David Wheeler, John Davis, Daniel Roberts, Thomas R. Jackson, Jess (illegible), Amos Smith, Perry Smith, Peter C. McMakin, Jas Burns M. D., William Wilson, John Booker, Thompson Davis.
Jury ruled death was by natural causes.

They had five children, all believed to be born in Spartanburg County: Pinckney, m. Hester Deaver; Elizabeth, m. George Ballard; William Wallace, m. Eliza Gudger; Eliza, m. James Hensley; and Sarah Ann, m. Reuben Deaver. Mahala Clement Rollins died in 1884 in Madison County, North Carolina. T.J. Rollins died in 1891 in the same county. UNINDEXED DEEDS FROM SPARTANBURG COUNTY

To a researcher an index is a great aid. However, indices are not always complete as this example will show. The following items include personal property transactions, slave sales, affidavits, and other non-real estate related items found in the deed books in the Office of the Register of Mesne Conveyances for Spartanburg County (the R. M. C. Office). As you will see, they are a gold mine of information. (In one item I found documentation for a marriage that I had hunted since 1974. The earliest item was recorded in 1785 and the latest I have found was 1868.) Yet, they are inaccessible to those not able to search through the original deed books page by page because the indices for this county only include real estate transactions, mortgages, powers of attorney, etc. which directly relate to land. I have checked all of the items below and not one of them appears in the official index to Spartanburg County deeds. Due to the age of these records and their uselessness in title and other legal work (which is the primary goal of the R. M. C. Office) there are no plans to index them. In an effort to aid the researcher, the editor will present systematic, chronological abstracts of these items. I have begun with Deed Book U since all earlier deed books have been abstracted and published by another individual. In order to facilitate the ordering of photocopies by interested individuals, I have noted multi-page documents. If only one page number is given, the document appears only on that page. The original spellings of names, places, etc. have been retained.

It traces the church from its establishment as a mission of Bethlehem Baptist in 1804, through its organization in 1827, up to the history's publication in 1884. This volume, though small in size, contains a wealth of information, both historical and genealogical, on Mount Zion and its early members.

- This is first in a two volume set which will include all of the Piedmont. Chester, Greenville, Spartanburg, Union, York, and Pickens Districts are in this volume. (Pickens at the time incorporated what is now Oconee County. Cherokee County was then found as part of Spartanburg, Union, and York counties.) Ms. Berry has listed all persons legible on the microfilm copy at the S. C. state archives. She has given their name, sex, age, race, and month of death as reported by the enumerator.

- This book is a history of the Carlisle Wesleyan Church located in Spartanburg County, South Carolina. It contains many pictures and extensive genealogical notes on its early families. It also contains miscellaneous data on the community. Families included are: Acre, Brannon, Burnett, Cannon, Greene, Harmon, Horton, Kennedy, Kimbrell, Koon, McMillan, Parris, Sexy, Shirley, Smith, Stephens, Turner, Williams, and Wright.
